At our 200th Anniversary Banquet Celebration, the Rev. Jim Moss inspired and challenged us with the words above: "Love Jesus and Love People." He first congratulated the congregation for 200 years of ministry, noting that a very small percentage of American congregations are still functioning this long. He then quickly challenged us with these two simple commissions.

If we are going to continue to be effective at what God has called us to be, we are going to need to know Jesus like never before, and to love people in new ways in a fast-changing culture.

Rev. Moss said, first we need to "know" Jesus if we can truly love him. For how can we love anyone we don't know? The best way to know Jesus is through his words and actions contained in the Scriptures. Even as doing God's word has become harder, Jesus' disciples have abandoned the discipline of the reading and study of the scriptures.

To that end, he challenged us with a very specific task. For 40 days, read a chapter a day from the Gospels of Mark and Luke. After reading each chapter, reflect and pray, listen to what Jesus is saying to you. The greater challenge is for 87 days. Read a chapter a day from all four Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Reflect and pray. Then when the 40 or 87 days are up, start over again.

The only way we can deeply and truly love Jesus is to "know Him." And we will know him better through the Bible. So, here is your summer reading assignment from Jim, from your Pastor, and more importantly, from your Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

In my preaching this summer, I will be preaching each Sunday from the Gospels to help us get to know Jesus better. In addition, there are several of

News from the Parish Nurse ... STROKE

The month of July has been designated as **National Stroke Awareness Month.** Stroke is the fourth leading cause of death in America and a leading cause of adult disabilities. Up to 80% of strokes are preventable. They can be prevented through early medical intervention. A stroke or a "brain attack" occurs when a clot blocks an artery or a blood vessel ruptures or leaks blood, interrupting oxygenated blood flow to an area of the brain. When either of these things happens, brain cells begin to die and brain damage occurs.

When brain cells die during a stroke, abilities controlled by that area of the brain are lost. Those abilities July include speech, movement and memory. How a person is affected depends on where the stroke occurs in the brain and the amount of damage. For example, a person who has had a "small" stroke July experience only minor problems such as weakness of an arm or leg. Larger strokes July produce paralysis on one side and/or the loss of speech. Some people recover completely from strokes, but more than 2/3 of survivors experience some disability.

The following risk factors can be changed, treated or controlled: *High Blood Pressure (Hypertension), *Heart (Atrial Fibrillation) and Blood Vessel Diseases, *High Cholesterol, *Diabetes, *Sickle Cell Disease, *Smoking, Obesity, *Physical Inactivity. Our age, a family history of strokes, gender, and race are factors that we cannot change. Getting medical attention and administering "clot busting" drugs within a three hour window of the symptoms, is critical for a better outcome.

Common stroke myths:

Myth – Stroke is unpreventable. Reality – Stroke is largely preventable

Myth – Stroke cannot be treated. Reality – Stroke requires emergency treatment within 3 hours of onset of symptoms.

Myth – Stroke only affects the elderly. Reality – Stroke can happen to anyone.

Myth – Stroke happens to the heart. Reality – Stroke is a brain "attack".

Myth – Stroke recovery only happens for a few months following a stroke. Reality – Recovery continues throughout life.

ACT FAST if you suspect a stroke: Fast is the acronym to assess a person for symptoms of a stroke.

Face – Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?

Arms – Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

Speech – Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase. Is their speech slurred or strange?

Time – If any of these symptoms occur, call 9-1-1 immediately.
