As we draw to the end of a joyful, surprising, and challenging 200th Anniversary year, we also begin a new church year - on December 2, 2012. It is the First Sunday of Advent. Advent is a season of preparation and hope. It has sometimes been called a *'Season of Three Comings,'* as we remember Jesus' first coming and birth into the world, celebrate his coming and presence with us right now, and anticipate his coming again to rule in complete justice and peace.

Christ has been present in Evangelical Lutheran Church of Durham throughout this past year of 2012 (Special Anniversary Celebrations, storms, several extensive building and property improvements, worship, growing children's ministry, loss of precious loved ones, and continuing faith in God's promises). As we "come" to a new church year and new calendar year, our 201st year of ministry, Christ is with us! Christ will be strengthening us, encouraging us, comforting us, and pushing us ahead into new avenues of ministry. Christ's Spirit will be transforming us for the 21st century.

How can our hands do God's work in a new year? How can we worship faithfully, pray regularly, dig into the Scripture more faithfully to discover God's will for us? The Season of Advent can prepare us for our journey with Christ. The Gospel of Luke will assist us in our preparations from December 2, 2012 through the end of fall in 2013. My Advent hope for me and for you is that, as Evangelical Lutheran Church of Durham, we open ourselves to where God may be leading us, open ourselves to new possibilities, new ways of being the church. We have been so richly blessed by God's grace for 200 years. And God's grace will be the foundation enabling us to press on ahead. For we know and believe that "Christ has come! Christ is here! Christ is coming!"



#### From the PARISH NURSE

The flu and cold season is now upon us, but cough and cold medications can pose serious risks for children. Most of these medications are not recommended for children under age two and it is debated whether they are appropriate for older children. They don't effectively treat the underlying causes of a cold or make it go away. The FDA is studying the safety of these medications for children older than two. When giving an older child a cough or cold medicine, carefully follow the label directions. Do not give the child two medicines with the same active ingredient, such as an antihistamine, decongestant, or pain reliever. Too much of a single ingredient could lead to an accidental overdose. If a child has a cold, antibiotics will have no effect on it. Colds are caused by viruses and antibiotics treat bacterial infections.

Pain relievers, such as acetaminophen (Tylenol) or ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin) can be given to reduce a fever or relieve a sore throat. Take care to follow the dosing directions on the bottle carefully. Do not give ibuprofen to a child younger than six months and don't give aspirin to children younger than 18 years. Aspirin has been associated with a condition known as Reye's Syndrome, a rare but potentially serious illness.

#### Some tips to help the child feel better:

- \*offer fluids-water, juice, and broth can help loosen congestion \*chicken soup has an anti-inflammatory effect
- \*cool mist humidifier change the water daily
- \*ice cream or ice pops can help soothe a sore throat
- \*plenty of rest.

#### Contact the doctor:

- \* if the child has a high or persistent fever
- \* has a persistent cough,

Ways to prevent a cold:

\*has thick green nasal discharge

- \*wash hands thoroughly and often
- \*avoid sharing drinks, utensils, etc

- \*steam from a hot shower may help
- \*cold or warm drinks
- \*saline nasal drops or spray can loosen thick mucus
- \*has trouble swallowing,
- \*has yellow or green discharge from the eyes,
- \*has ear or sinus pain.
- \*cough or sneeze into a tissue or into the crook of the arm
- \*avoid prolonged contact with people with colds.

#### **Hurricane Sandy Relief**

- Five dust masks
- One pair work gloves
- One 6-9 oz. bottle of insect repellent (pump, drops or lotion, not aerosol)
- 28-bag roll of heavy-duty trash bags (30-45 gallon)
- Eighteen cleaning towels (reusable, like Easy Wipes®)
- One 12 oz. bottle of liquid concentrated household cleaner (like Lysol®)
- One 25 oz. bottle liquid disinfectant dish soap (like Dawn®)

H Please provide all liquids in new, unopened plastic bottles.

H Be sure to provide only new materials.

H If the requested item size is not available, go down to the next available size.

H You do not have to provide all of the items. Any contribution is welcome.

Hygiene Kits: In the face of natural disasters, Hygiene Kits can mean the difference between sickness and health for struggling families. Our colleagues at Church World Service (CWS) and the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) collect and distribute these kits or can tell us how to get them to those in immediate need.

To assemble a Hygiene Kit you will need:

- One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28" (no fingertip or bath towels)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb
- One nail clipper

Bleach (two 1-quart or one 82 oz. bottle)

• One 50-78 oz. box dry laundry detergent

• Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.

Two pairs latex gloves (like Playtex®)

Seven sponges, assorted sizes

- One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper)
   One toothbrush (in original packaging)

Six standard size Band-Aids®

Place all items in a one-gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure, remove excess air from bag, and seal. Please do not add toothpaste to the Hygiene Kit. Please include toothpaste for kits in a separate package.

Hygiene Kit value: \$10 Processing/Shipping Cost: \$2 per Kit
