"We are a People of a Covenant - the Covenant of Baptism"

Covenant is not a popular word in our culture or daily conversation. Much more common is the word "Contract." In a contract, I agree to do something for you (like make a mortgage or car payment), and you, in turn, will do something for me (sign over the house or car). We are so accustomed to this kind of give and take in our relationships and daily doings, that the concept of covenant is foreign to us.

But the Hebrew Scriptures highlight "covenant" - more specifically covenants (plural). In these covenants, God freely gives us a blessing, a promise, a gift, which changes our identity and our purpose as human beings. Throughout the Lenten Season in 2015, the Old Testament readings focus on five covenants: Covenant with Noah (February 22); Covenant with Abraham and Sarah (March 1); Covenant with Moses and the Israelites on Mt. Sinai (March 8; Covent of healing and life for the Israelites in the wilderness (March 15); and a new covenant for the people through the Prophet Jeremiah (March 22). These covenants provide many blessings to the people of God - a rainbow and a promise never to destroy with a flood again; a new name and a new home and descendants; the 10 commandments as a guide for healthy living; healing from sin; and a blessing of God's presence in the heart, not just on tablets or paper.

You and I are all descendants of these convents and one more - the unbelievable covenant God makes with us in our baptism. Though we are sinners, rebellious and forgetful of God's will for us, God washes us, forgives us, and through His Son Jesus, dies for us. We are healed and saved a given a new life through the waters of baptism. This baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world. In a way we are given new names, a new identity. In baptism we are "always being made mew."

Let's observe Lent together on Sundays and on Thursday evenings, and in our daily lives as children of our baptismal covenant.

For most of us on Council, the worst part of the job is counting the receipts after church. It doesn't seem that daunting: sort the envelopes by type, count the loose cash and checks. Open the envelopes, separate by cash or check, assure that the check number and amount are correctly written on each envelope, list the totals on the weekly sheet under each category. The problems come when we total everything and the amounts we have don't match the totals on the sheet and we have to go over and over everything trying to reconcile the amounts. The most common cause of the totals not matching up are checks split among multiple envelopes. They cause untold hours of misery for our counters, and for our Financial Secretary, who has to try to rectify the errors. The absolute worst are checks split between different deposit accounts, such as the regular account and the building or memorial fund. Believe me, no one who has ever dealt with this would dare inflict it on fellow council members on pain of shunning.

Of course, no one wants to write three or four checks each week to donate to the multiple causes in our envelope box. What works for me is to write my largest check at the beginning of the month to the regular [green] envelope. Most of the expenses are paid from that fund, including the costs of communion. Other weeks, I might choose to donate to one of the designated funds, Mission Support, Good Neighbor, or Building; one envelope, one check. If I just want to put a few dollars toward something, cash works fine. Of course, we'll gratefully take your money any way we can get it, but good volunteers are hard to come by. We don't need to discourage them by making their job any harder than it needs to be. Thank you for your consideration, and for all you give and do. Keep praying that our boiler holds on just a little longer.

Schedule: March 5: Durham; March 12: Christ, Springtown; March 19: Trinity Lutheran, Pleasant Valley; and March 27: Durham.


Community Easter Egg Hunt - Saturday, March 28, starting promptly at 10 AM. Bring your own baskets!
