"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4:19-19)

Jesus comes to us in the year of Luke with good news for the poor and hungry, the sick or grieving, the oppressed, the guilt-ridden, the disconsolate, the hopeless. Please come and share in worship the message of Luke, and the saving presence of our Lord Jesus Christ!

Council Corner From your Council President ...

The Congregational Meeting for approval of the 2016 budget is scheduled for December 13th after worship. I hope by now many of you have

taken a copy of the proposed budget home and reviewed it. If you can convey any questions or concerns to Council beforehand, it might help shorten the meeting. Then we can all get downstairs to that delicious dinner WELCA has prepared for us.

The other meeting required by our constitution is more problematic. It's important to try to have the Annual Meeting before Council reorganizes at its March meeting and elects officers. Easter is early next year, so February 7th, the last Sunday before Lent begins, is our projected meeting date. We know how unpredictable the weather can be then, and how difficult it can be to decide, even a day or two ahead, whether to proceed with cooking and setting up for a big dinner or postpone. Having two large dinners every winter is a wonderful tradition. It's great fellowship, and it rewards those who care enough about the functioning of the church to stay for the meeting, thereby giving us our required quorum. But it also means a lot of work for all the members who prepare the food, as well as for Council. Do we want to consider changing this tradition? No, we can't abolish the meeting. However, we could simplify things by just having Council supply some reasonably healthy snacks like crackers and cheese and coffee. These could be consumed during the meeting, and we'd all get home a lot earlier. Let us know what you think about this at the Budget Meeting.

Now just a reminder to our employees who have contact with children. We need copies of your State Police, Department of Human Services, and FBI background checks before the end of December. Volunteers who have been working with our kids for years have until June, but we all know how time flies. Since the State Police ones are now free, please redo those when you do your DHS ones so the expiration dates will agree for renewal in 5 years. New volunteers for children's activities have to supply background checks before starting. Please don't be discouraged by this; the kids need you.

In November we hosted the **Upper Bucks Conference WELCA gathering.** Karen Reever from Habitat for Humanity spoke to us about new program they are providing called **A Brush with Kindness**. Home owners whose income is below 80% of the average income for the county are eligible for help making repairs to the outside of their homes. Habitat offers low interest loans to pay for supplies and paid staff; but most of the work is done by volunteers. Anyone ap-

plying must be up to date on their mortgage and tax payments (they don't want to further drive a struggling person into debt.) Karen interviews applicants and in some cases supplies counseling and referrals to other sources of help. For example, she said that Home Depot has a program which aids veterans, and she directs all veterans to them. We filled Karen's car with donations to the Habitat store.

On **Sunday December 13th**, following the budget meeting, WELCA will host our annual Christmas covered dish dinner. Please join us for a time of fellowship and good food. We will supply the beverages, rolls & butter; you bring a dish and/or desert to share. The tables will be decorated with poinsettias which will be given to our shut-in members.

Our January meeting will be held Monday January 11, 2016 at 1:30 in the church fellowship hall. The main order of business is the January Soup Supper.

SleepOUT 4 Homelessness - This event took place from 7 PM on Saturday evening, November 14, to 8 AM the following Sunday morning. 233 kids and adults from Bucks and Montgomery counties slept in makeshift cardboard shelters. Before going to bed, they participated in educational simulations about what it might be like to be poor and/or homeless. ELC of Durham had a brave crew consisting of Georgana, Jim, Emma, Alivia, and Charlotte Humphreys; Cathy and Matthew Mueller; and Pastor Deal. We teamed up with a group from Trinity Lutheran and Trinity UCC in Pleasant Valley, and St. Peter's Lutheran in Riegelsville. More than \$25,000 was raised to assist with the fight against home-lessness in our area. Emma, Alivia, Charlotte, and Matthew collected about \$900. Great work!

Working Together to End Malaria - The ELCA Malaria Campaign has exceeded its fundraising goal of \$15 million!!! Do you remember our participation a few years ago? THANK YOU for the part you played in contributing to the success of this mission effort. You have helped to protect countless lives from Malaria. While the ELCA Malaria Campaign will officially end on January 31, 2016, our commitment to ending deaths from this disease will not. In the coming years, support to our companions and partners to address malaria will come through gifts to ELCA World Hunger, which has a long history of supporting health-related work.

Palisades Area CROP Walk - Thanks be to God! The results are in. There were 77 walkers who participated on October 18 in either the 1 mile or 4 mile walk. 21 of these represented ELC of Durham. As you can see from the list published by Cluster Treasurer Linda Frey on page 2, ELC of Durham walkers collected more than \$1600! THANK YOU! THANK YOU! Together, we are continuing to end hunger one step at a time. 25% of the total raised will fight hunger locally, benefitting the Riegelsville Meals on Wheels and the Lord's Pantry.

Homeless Ministry Begins December 1 - AHUB (Advocates for the Homeless of Upper Bucks) Code Blue Homeless Shelter program has permanently located this winter to 501 W. Broad Street in Quakertown, the Masonic Lodge building. AHUB will operate from December first to March 31 on any evening when the temperature or wind chill drops to 26°F or below. Many new volunteers from carious churches in the area have signed up, training has taken place, and many supplies have been donated. There is one additional way YOU may be able to help, with meal donations. Each evening when the shelter is open, a hot meal is served around 9:30 PM. Food for 8-10 adults is need. Meals should be ready to "heat and serve," rich in carbohydrates, and not difficult to chew. Food may be prepared ahead of time, frozen, and stored in the freezer at the shelter kitchen. However, due to limited freezer space at the shelter, it is preferred that meals be dropped off at 8:30 PM on the assigned day. Food should be in disposable containers no larger than 9" x 9" and clearly marked with the entrée name, your name, and Code Blue. Snack donations are also accepted for guests to take with them as they leave the shelter. Contact Pastor Deal or Louise Butcher (267-377-5090) with questions.

Thanks to a robust screening process implemented by the State Department, the Department of Homeland Security, and others, we have welcomed refugees with confidence and very positive results.

It breaks my heart that so many other governors have abandoned that honorable tradition now, when the need is so great.

DEPRESSION Research indicates that depressive illnesses are disorders of the brain. Depression is a common but serious illness. Most people who experience depression need treatment to get better. Medications, psychotherapies, and other methods can effectively treat depression.



Depression is more common in women than men. Biological, life-cycle, hormonal, and psychological factors that women experience may be linked to women's higher depression rate. Researchers have shown that hormones directly affect the brain's chemistry that controls emotions and mood. For example, women are especially vulnerable to developing postpartum depression after giving birth, when hormonal and physical changes and the new responsibility of caring for a newborn can be overwhelming. During the transition into menopause, some women experience an increased risk for depression. Scientists are exploring how the cyclical rise and fall of estrogen and other hormones may affect a woman's brain chemistry.

Men often experience depression differently than women. Women are likely to have feelings of sadness, worthlessness, and excessive guilt. Men are more likely to be tired, irritable, a loss of interest in once pleasurable activities, and difficulty sleeping. They may become frustrated, discouraged, angry, and sometimes abusive. They also may be more likely to turn to alcohol or drugs. Although more women attempt suicide, many more men die by suicide.

Depression is not a normal part of aging. Studies show that most seniors have satisfying lives, despite having more illnesses or physical problems. It can be difficult to distinguish depression in older adults. Many experience grief after the loss of a loved one and grief is a normal reaction. Researchers are studying the relationship between complicated grief or grief that lasts for a very long time and depression. Medical conditions such as heart disease, stroke, or cancer may cause depressive symptoms. Some medications may have side effects that can contribute to symptoms.

The following are some lifestyle and home remedies from the Mayo Clinic:

*Stick to a treatment plan. Do not skip sessions or medications. Depressive symptoms may return and one may experience withdrawal like symptoms.

*Educate yourself about depression. This information can empower and motivate you to stick to a treatment plan.

*Pay attention to warning signs.

*Exercise and don't be a "couch potato".

*Avoid alcohol and drugs. In the long run they worsen symptoms and make depression harder to treat. *Get plenty of sleep. Stick to a sleep schedule. Go and get up at the same time every day, even weekends. Do not go to bed hungry or stuffed and avoid alcohol, nicotine, and caffeine as they have stimulating effects. Create a cool, dark, quiet environment, be wary of using the TV or electronic devices.

The National Institute of Mental Health funds cutting edge research into this debilitating disorder. The most common treatments for depression are medication and psychotherapy. If you or a loved one is experiencing depression call your family doctor or call 911 to go to a hospital emergency room for immediate help. Never dismiss feelings, especially of suicide. Point out realities and hope. Talk and listen carefully. Do not isolate yourself or leave a loved one alone. Go out for walks, outings, and other activities. Do not push to take on too much too soon. Set realistic goals. Use the toll-free 24 hour hotline of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-8255. Be patient, whether it is yourself or a loved one, for with time and treatment the depression will lift.
