Forward Together In Faith - 29th Annual SEPA Synod Assembly

May 6-7, 2016 - A Summary Report from Mark Harwick, Beth Snyder, and Pastor Deal

450-500 of us - pastors, voting members, visitors - from the 160 congregations of the SEPA Synod-ELCA gathered for worship, inspiration, elections, reports, decisions, and dreaming. We had some good faith time together and with other Lutheran Christians. It was a long two days, but never boring. We experienced healing, learning, and challenge.

Here are some of the highlights we'd like to share:

- Opening Communion Service with spirited song and powerful sermon by Bishop Claire S. Burkat
- Keystone Message from Rev. Dr. Kirsi Stjerna (Finland), Southwest Synod Professor of Lutheran History & Theology, Pacific Lutheran Seminary of California Lutheran University. The Rev. Dr. Stjerna summarized the highlights and themes of the Reformation, 500 years ago - freedom, education (Bible reading), equality and service to Christ. Then she jumped 500 years later to translate these themes for the church of the 21st century. How shall we proclaim freedom to those who are imprisoned in any way today? How shall we re-interpret the Catechisms and Luther's other writings for ourselves and the world? Dr. Stjerna combined knowledge, passion, and humor to prepare us for the future.
- Introduction of "Reformation 500" which begins now and culminates October 31, 2017. There will be numerous print and media resources made available to congregations for worship, Bible study, Sunday School and Confirmation, and ecumenical engagement. All of these resources will be released this summer, and we hope to use many of them here at ELC of Durham
- Announcement of a new Seminary, eventually bringing Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia and Gettysburg Seminary into some form of unity. This will happen over the next year or two.
- Update on a new, bold initiative, "Forward together in Faith" - a \$2.6 million fundraising campaign to help congregations respond to a changing church in a changing world. This campaign will not be for buildings, but rather to help congregations **innovate, network, communicate, and equip** members for discipleship in the 21st century. A portion of the campaign money will also go to the seminaries to be able to offer tuition-free seminary to students for three years. We will be asked to financially support this campaign as individual members and as a congregation.
- Adoption of a resolution designating October 2016 as "Lutheran Charities Appeal" month in our synod.
- Introduction of Candidates for Ordained Ministry, recent graduates of seminaries, some of whom are seeking to serve in our synod. What a diverse, enthusiastic, and talented bunch of men and women.

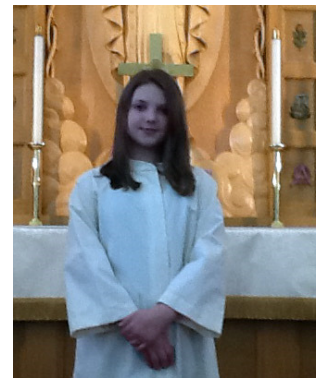

Child Abuse Clearances for Volunteers

By July 1st, 2016, all volunteers whose duties include contact with children must submit background clearances. Valerie McGinn will be coordinating this; please contact her with any questions. Although we will be holding Vacation Bible School before the deadline, we would prefer to have clearances on all who will be working with the children. We will need from you:

- Report of criminal history from the Pennsylvania State Police. Forms to mail in are available here but the faster route is online at epatch.state.pa.us
- Child abuse history from the Department of Human Services. Forms available or do online at keepkidssafe.pa.gov

Both of the above are required. They are free for volunteers every 57 months, but not valid for employment purposes. Again, results will be obtained much faster with the online option. All clearances need to be renewed every 5 years, based on the date of the oldest one.

If you have lived in PA continuously for the past 10 years, you will need to sign a form, witnessed by a church official, attesting to this. If you cannot meet this residency requirement, it gets more complicated, and expensive. You then need fingerprints processed through the FBI. You register online at pa.cogentid.com and must select the agency under which you will be volunteering. If you select the Department of Human Services, you will receive a clearance that is valid for us and it is slightly cheaper at \$25.75. However, if you also have children in the public school system, and wish to volunteer there, they will not accept this clearance. They only accept one done through the Department of Education, which will supply you with an “unofficial” report that is not valid for us, per DHS. So, to avoid having to pay for 2 separate fingerprints, check with your school system and ask if they will provide you with an “official” copy for us. Currently, Palisades will do so, per Susan Keogh in Human Resources. After registering, you will then go to a fingerprinting site. The UPS store in Hellertown seems to be most convenient to this area.

We must have copies of all these clearances and keep them on the premises. Everyone who has regular contact with children, whether as an employee or volunteer, is now considered a mandated reporter of suspected child abuse under the new laws. There are training sites on recognizing and reporting child abuse. Our Synod recommends ReportAbusePa.Pitt.edu. Thank you for your concern and commitment to our children.



BLOOD REPLACEMENT FOR NANCY FOX

You can donate blood to replace what Nancy Fox is using through the Miller-Keystone Blood Center. There is a convenient location at 2925 William Penn Highway in Easton. Their phone number is 610-559-7100. To donate blood, just call and leave a message at the number above. They will call you back to schedule an appointment. Appointments are at 15 minute intervals. Once you arrive, they will determine whether you can donate blood and/or platelets and collect your donation. The Easton Center's hours are:

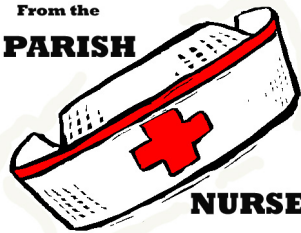

EXTREME HEAT - With the hot weather approaching, the following is a prevention guide from the CDC on dealing with extreme heat. The body normally cools itself by sweating, but several factors may affect the body's ability to cool itself. When the humidity is high, sweat will not evaporate quickly, preventing the body from releasing heat quickly. Other conditions related to risk include age, obesity, fever, dehydration, heart disease, poor circulation, sunburn, mental illness, prescription drugs, and alcohol use. Those at the highest risk for heat related sickness are the very

young, the elderly, the mentally ill, and those with chronic diseases. People with heart disease or high blood pressure, or who take certain medications or have poor circulation are also affected by extreme heat. Air-conditioning is the number one protective factor against heat sicknesses. Even a few hours in air-conditioning can help the body stay cooler when once again exposed to the heat.

During hot weather one needs to increase their fluid intake, regardless of activity level. Don't wait until you are thirsty to drink. If you are limited to the amount of fluid you drink or if on a water pill, ask your doctor how much you should drink when the weather is hot. Do not drink liquids that contain alcohol or large amounts of sugar – these actually cause loss of fluid.

Heavy sweating removes salt and minerals from the body and they are necessary for the body to function properly. Salts and minerals must be replaced. A sports drink, such as Gatorade, can replace them. Once again, check with your doctor if you are on a salt restricted diet.

Wear appropriate clothing and sunscreen. Choose lightweight, light-colored, loose fitting clothing. Sunburn affects the body's ability to cool itself and causes a loss of fluid. Schedule outdoor activities to morning or evening hours. Rest in shaded areas, to give the body a chance to cool.

The CDC recommends drinking cool, non-alcoholic or non-sugary, fluids each hour. Wear wide-brimmed hats, sunglasses, and use sunscreen of SF of 15 or higher when out in the sun. Reapply the sunscreen every 30 minutes or as directed
