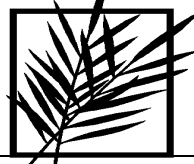

"Seeing Everything Through the Lens of the Cross"

Christian disciples ought always to have the cross of Jesus before us - but especially in this Lenten Season. Last week, our Palisades Cluster of Churches began a five Thursday evening schedule based on "Making Sense of the Cross" by Robert Lose. I think we all would agree that the cross is the central symbol of our faith. Yet, do we fully understand how the cross leads us?

The experience of Jesus' death on the cross can seem to be confusing, saddening, infuriating, fear-producing. We confess that Jesus died for us. But why did this innocent Son of God have to die such a cruel and horrible death? Why did God initiate it or allow it to happen? Couldn't God have just blotted out all sin and death without the cross?

I certainly do not have satisfactory answers for all these questions. But here are just a few ideas I want to share with you. Jesus' suffering and death seem to be an identification with our own humanity, our own suffering. Perhaps God willed Jesus to die for us because God loved us and understood our struggles. Many have said that if you want to understand God, you can't do it without the cross.

The cross is an unbelievable act of service and love. Jesus died because he loved us - so much. God cared about us so much that God died to bring us forgiveness and new life. God could have just used omnipotent power to make everything right. But God chose loving sacrifice to do it.

The cross sometimes seems hard to look on or think about. On the other hand, the cross is a beautiful image of perfect love. Martin Luther discovered a loving God on the cross, after a life-long struggle with an angry God. Luther wrote that everything we believe, everything we are, everything we do must be informed by the cross of Jesus.

I invite you to be near the cross throughout these 40 days, right through Holy Week.

Food banks: We will be collecting **canned meats** for the food banks in March. A big thank you to George and Betty Krietz who donated a case of tuna which went out with the Souper Bowl of Caring food.

MARCH SOUP SUPPER IS WEDNESDAY March 21st

Soups are Cream of broccoli and Chicken noodle.

We will again need a Wednesday crew to help prepare the soups, set up & take down, jar and serve. On Monday March 19th we will need a day crew to pot watch and a night crew to work on the broth. Please mark your calendars and share your time and talents with us.

February Soup Report: We sold 87 quarts of cream of potato (16 on Sunday on sale for \$5.00). We sold 116 quarts of vegetable. We also served both soups at our Thursday Lenten service. 29 adults, and 2 kids ate in. We had tremendous help with this endeavor and want to thank everyone who participated. (Please forgive me if I miss anyone.)

The Kressmans for ordering all our vegetable and stock supplies and for donating the cabbage and carrots we used. **Springtown Meat** for donating the beef bones. **Dorothy Peterman** for paying for our beef. We didn't have a Beef Roast, so no leftovers to use. **Our bakers:** Miriam Anderson, Esther Couse, Helen Dungan, Lyn Gaun, Lois Miller, Dot Peterman, Barbara Naska, and Lynn Gaun for their donations of desserts and bread.

The Monday crew: Miriam Anderson, Helen Dungan, Mark Harwick, Val McGinn, Dot Peterman and Althea Crouse made the beef broth, peeled onions, washed jars, strained the broth, pulled the meat off the bones, and washed pots. These folks then came back in to chop the onions and celery so we could freeze it after the ice storm that cancelled our January soup sale.

The chief chefs, Mark Harwick (vegetable soup) Nancy Moskella (potato soup), and Esther Crouse (head chef).

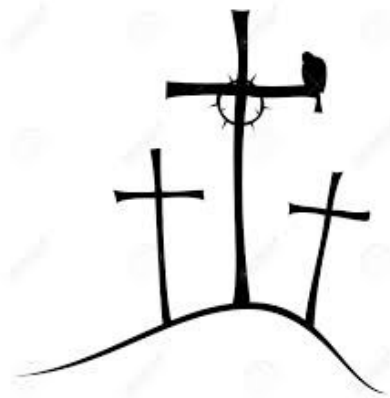
