Your Eyes and the Sun

We all know to use sunscreen to protect our skin from the sun, but very often we neglect to protect our eyes. Studies have shown that exposure to bright sunlight may increase the risk of developing cataracts, age-related macular degeneration, and growths of the eye. The same risk applies to tanning spas.

UV radiation, whether from natural sunlight or artificial rays can damage the eye's surface tissue, as well as, the cornea and lens. Studies have also shown that people in the snowy outdoors, especially skiers and snow-boarders, not wearing protective lenses, showed symptoms of eye damage (cornea) and disease. The highest levels of UV rays were in the late winter and early spring and that reflection of the sun off the snow intensified the rays.

Some researchers suggest that the light-sensitive cells in the eyes are important in regulating the wake-sleep cycles. As we age, more people have problems with insomnia. Though it is important to protect the eyes from overexposure to UV light, the eyes also need minimal exposure to natural light to help maintain normal sleep-wake cycles. Minimizing light from lamps and the television is essential. Researchers also warn that looking directly into a solar eclipse is as dangerous as looking directly into an unblocked sun and can cause damage to the retina.

Protect your eyes from the sun by:

- *using wraparound sunglasses that block UV rays (100%),
- *wear hats,
- *don't rely on UV protected contact lenses, wear sun glasses as well,
- *don't be fooled by clouds, sun rays can pass through them,
- *never look directly into the sun, and
- *protect all ages, children through seniors.

Esther: WELCA is offering a three-part Bible study on the book of Esther this summer. It comes from WELCA's Gather Magazine. Our next gathering will be Wednesday, August 14, 2019 at 10:00 a.m. at the home of Kathy Hlavaty. This is a breakfast gathering and **Men** are also invited. We will begin by reviewing the first session as it was sparsely attended. Please read the book of Esther in preparation. We will schedule session three at this meeting as we try to accommodate everyone's calendars.

Water of Life The synodical gathering of WELCA was held at Trinity Lutheran Church, Lansdale on Saturday June 1, 2019. The focus was God's gift of water to us, and our need to care for this gift. As part of our offering we brought our water bottles forward to be blessed. We collected \$1,582.54 for Flint.

The featured speaker, Trudy Phillips, spoke about how our water ways run and what affects them. She began with a dramatic demonstration; she had 5 gallons of water on the table; from this she measured out 1 ½ cups – this represented fresh as opposed to salt water. She then used an **eye dropper** to show the amount of that water which was drinkable. She explained how water moves downward either above or underground, picking up debris as it travels. This eventually ends in our streams and rivers, then flows into the oceans.

Information was shared from Pastor Monica Villarreal, of Salem Lutheran Church in Flint Michigan, on the situation there. Salem and Shiloh Baptist Church are delivering water to 170 vulnerable homes – people with immunity impairments which make them extremely susceptible to infection. The cost of this runs about \$5,000 per month and is being paid by donations. Pastor said they are church, serving these people especially when death occurs - praying for then and responding to their spiritual needs, not just their physical needs.

Our third speaker was Hope Grosse who with Joanne Stanton recently formed the Buxmont Coalition for Safe Water. Both are originally from the Warminster area and they and their families have suffered serious health issues as a result of the release of chemicals, PFAS (Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances), into the ground from Willow Grove Naval Base. The chemical is part of firefighting foam, and seeped through the ground into the water. She cautioned us that this chemical is not included in normal water tests; and strongly suggested everyone install a **reverse osmosis water filter.**

Food ministry: Thanks to everyone who donated personal care items to our May and June collections. We are collecting baby care products for Easton Food Bank and paper products for Upper Bucks in July and August.

Food baskets: WELCA put a basket on the altar with men's personal care items, It was in memory and honor of the fathers in our congregation. The money used was from the soup supper.
