"Adjusting to a New Normal for God's Church"

After nearly three months of being asked to stay at home, we are now thinking of the future. Our worship, fellowship, Christian Education, and church administration have all been radically changed. How long will it be like this and what will it be like when we return to our church buildings? It seems everything has changed - and we usually don't like change.

A reminder - the Church of Jesus Christ has constantly changed since the 1st Century. The Church has faced opposition, persecution, and countless historical changes in the world, In the beginning and for several centuries, there were NO church buildings in which to worship. Christian disciples met in hones - imagine that! Then there were challenges of conflict both within and outside of the church - like diseases, the Crusades, a Reformation, splits and divisions, and the list goes on and on.

Still, the Church of Jesus Christ has endured. And it continues now. This pandemic has taught us several new things that need to continue, even after we come back to our buildings.

- 1. Frequent communication and connection with each other is must! By social media, email, telephone, etc. we must reach out to each other.
- 2. Our new Virtual Worship Services are reaching many more people than just those who show up on a Sunday morning. I believe we will need to do both in the future services in the Sanctuary on Sunday mornings that are broadcast simultaneously.
- 3. We have learned something new about "loving one another" because of this pandemic. It's not just about "me" its about "us." I wear my mask to protect "you." This neighbor love needs to extend in new ways to the poor, the hungry, the immigrant, the nursing home resident, the abused, the isolated. The Church's mission will expand.

We have always been the Church. We are the Church today. And we will be the Church in the future - in surprising new ways!

Return to In-Person Worship

When will we be able to return to in-person worship on the top of the hill on Durham Road? We don't know the exact answer to that yet. We have just reached the Yellow Phase and Governor Wolf has not yet indicated when Bucks County will reach the Green Phase.

The Church Council voted at its May Council Meeting not to open the building back up until after the Green Phase begins, in order to give un time to prepare for opening safely. The Council is now working on all the plans that need to made. These plans include:

- Would it be wise to have a outdoor services?
- Masks will be required.
- Social Distancing and separation will be required in the sanctuary and outside.
 - No congregational or choir singing can happen for awhile, because singing spreads droplets at a much wider range than simply speaking.
 - No touching, sharing of the Peace, offering, or Communion are just a few of our challenges.
 - We must have ample sanitizer wipes, towels, masks, and other physical equipment to help maintain sanitary conditions in the church building.
 - In our planning, we are following the advice of health professionals, the Wisconsin Council of Churches published guidelines, and advice from our own ELCA.

Pastoral Letter from Rev. David M. Deal

Dear People of God – Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

June 2, 2020

Today when I awakened, I was filled with heaviness, sadness, turmoil, anger. Today happens to be the day of the Pennsylvania Primary Election. But my state of mind has nothing to do with politics. Instead, it has to do with division, danger, chaos!

You and I find ourselves three months into an international pandemic that has killed more than 105,000 Americans, and hundreds of thousands of our neighbors around the world as well. We cry and grieve with those who have been stricken or died. We pray for those who have lost jobs and income and look for ways to help them. We identify with all who have been emotionally stressed by "stay at home" orders, who may feel alone and depressed.

My disturbed feelings this morning are also related to the racial division in our nation as a result of the brutal police killing of **George Floyd**. This killing, the latest in a series of deaths of African-Americans at the hands of police, has led to despair, confusion, and rage. The injustice of Floyd's killing has led to legitimate peaceful protests seeking radical reform to our criminal justice system in more than 100 American cities in all 50 states. There have also been many instances of illegitimate, selfish, senseless looting and vandalism of American businesses. Some who looted may have been using the protests as cover for their criminal activity. Some may have been recruited by social media to incite unrest and violence. Others may have given in to the rage born of centuries of unjust and unequal treatment. The result has been danger to the protestors, danger to the police, danger to innocent American citizens. The result has been national **chaos!**

As people of God, we need to be reminded that we worship not a God of chaos, but a God of peace and harmony. Our God is not a God of sickness, but a God of healing. Our God is not a God of killing, but a God of love. But here we are --- shocked, stunned, caught in national chaos. And the reason I awakened this morning angry and enraged was what the President of the United States said and did early yesterday evening.

First, the President announced from the Rose Garden that he was willing to use the military to stop the demonstrations and protests. This is not only against the law, but contrary to American tradition. Protest has been a part of our national story for more than 200 years, since the Boston Tea Party. The President criticized governors and mayors, calling them weak, when they are working as best they can to bring about order in their states or cities as peacefully as possible. Instead of offering to cooperate with them to end the chaos, he simply distanced himself from those political leaders, when it is important for all to work together to end the violence and vandalism.

Then the President, with very little warning, walked across the street, surrounded by Secret Service agents and members of his Administration. He went to historic St. John's Episcopal Church, where presidents have worshiped and prayed for more than a century. This church building had just lost its nursey in a fire and was closed. The Episcopal Rector and the Episcopal Bishop of Washington, DC, Rev. Mariann Budde, had not been contacted, and no warning and thus no permission had been given for an appearance at the church. The President simply walked in front of the church Parish House, stood next to the sign listing the names of the clergy, held up a Bible – UPSIDE DOWN – and stood for a photo-op. He neither prayed nor read from the Bible. He just stood for a moment and had his picture taken. Then, he walked back to the White House.

Unfortunately, in order for him to go to St. John's Church uninvited, law enforcement - including the National Guard, Secret Service, and Arlington County police - beat back the peaceful protestors and used gas canisters to force them away from the church. This included pastors on the church patio who were providing food for the protestors, and volunteers who were providing first aid. I join with Bishop Budde in her rage. This was an act of blasphemy – a moral and spiritual outrage. These actions do not demonstrate any spirit of leadership by the President, and they fail to reflect the values of the Kingdom of God – respect, love, non-violence, justice. Instead, his actions portray the world's sinful values of selfishness, brute force, and violence to human souls.

These are just some of the thoughts and feelings filling me as I awakened today. I am fearful. I am ashamed of our national leadership. I search for an appropriate response as a Christian, a disciple of Jesus Christ. I found some solace and reassurance in the very Bible the President held up so callously. I would like to share a passage with you today – from St. Paul's 8th chapter of the Letter to the Romans, verses 31 and 37-39:

The living Word of God begins:

"What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor RULERS, nor things present [COVID-19 pandemic, national division, racism], nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the LOVE OF GOD IN CHRIST JESUS OUR LORD."

Sisters and Brothers in Christ, we have been formed into Christ's Church by love. Jesus has shown us the values of the Kingdom of God – respect, compassion, unity, peace, non-violence, justice. Sinners though we are, let us all strive to live up to these values by our words and our actions. This may be the most difficult time any of us have ever experienced. Yet God will lead us through, for WE ARE THE CHURCH.
