From Death to Life: A Lenten Journey ***March 9 - April 24, 2011***

Gail Ramshaw, in her Lenten devotional, 40 Days and 40 Nights, writes of journeys:

"Most of us have never embarked on a journey. We take road trips, and go on hikes, and enjoy vacation travel, maybe splurge on a cruise, perhaps even join an expedition. But journey is a lengthy ordeal, marked by the unexpected, the delightful, or disastrous.

In 1742, Henry Melchior Muhlenberg left his comfortable homeland in Germany and sailed to colonial Pennsylvania to minister to its Lutheran churches. When the ship ran out of drinking water, the rats, who also were thirsty, licked the sweat off the passengers' faces while they slept. That's a journey!

Deuteronomy 26 (Part of the Old Testament Torah) speaks of the beginning of the journey - slavery in Egypt - and of the end of the journey - arrival in the land of milk and honey. Of the journey itself, the decades of woeful nomadic life, this Deuteronomic creed says only that God helped them through."

Ash Wednesday, March 9, begins an extraordinary journey for us children of God, who are baptized into the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Our journey is an annual pilgrimage in the Springtime [in the northern hemisphere - "lent" means "springtime."] Lent is a journey on which we encounter once more, as a church, the saving, life-giving mercy of the triune God.

We speak of the time from Ash Wednesday through Easter Day as a "Lenten journey," moving through the forty days (Lent) to the great Three Days (Maundy or Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Day). We take this journey in the company of our brothers and sisters in Christ, formed to be a body: living, moving, breathing, and walking through the world.

Our journey will include signs and symbols like ashes, water, bread and wine, and a cross. It will include challenges like temptation, guilt, weakness, illness, and grief. We will journey through the results of our sin - broken relationships, fear, and despair. But God will help us through to Easter Day with forgiveness, new life, resurrection, and salvation. This is a journey not to be missed.

This journey from death to life is no joke. It can be long and arduous. But such a journey will change your life, and not just your individual life, but your communal, shared life in God.

Please read the road markers on page 3 that will mark our journey together in Lent (Spring) 2011.

Contentment was the discussion at our Lady's Bible Study this week. Do you complain about the situation, do you stay up all night worrying, do you blame others or do you take it to the Lord in prayer and then learn to be patient and wait on Him? Jesus tells us in John 16:33 "Here on earth you will have many trials and sorrows. But take heart, because I have overcome the world." In James 1:2 the Bible tells us "Dear brothers and sisters whenever trouble comes your way let it be an opportunity for joy." Wow! I guess that's where the saying "Something Good always comes out of Something Bad" comes from. So I guess what I am trying to say here, is let us all be a little more contented with the life that God has given us and when we find ourselves complaining about something – stop and think – what good can come out of this. Remember God can use us, just as we are, so long as we are willing to be used. All the trials we have to go through serve His purposes in making us grow into the person He wants us to become.

Let God use you just as you are – take God's message out into the world, invite people to church, be a happy contented worker in God's church by getting involved and volunteering, always love one another.

Outreach - Helen Dungan

Souper Bowl of caring: Thanks to everyone who contributed to Souper Bowl of Caring; and especially to Cheryl Mesko for coordinating it. The food and money was split between the Easton and Upper Bucks food banks. We had a donation of over 100 cans of soup from Williams Township Elementary School, a big thanks to Katie Aquino who organized their food drive.

Food banks: In March, we will be collecting **canned pasta (ravioli, spaghetti, etc.)** for the food banks; this is at the request of the Easton food bank.

Personal care items: If you are traveling and have a collection of those little bottles of shampoo, conditioner, or soap the hotels supply, the food banks could use them. Easton creates little gift bags of personal care items to give out. One of their volunteers actually asked all the travelers on a recent bus trip to give her their unused loot.

Food baskets: It is a tradition at Durham to place food baskets rather than flowers on the altar during Lent. If you would be willing to sponsor one, there is a sign up sheet on the bulletin board in the narthex. You can either purchase food yourself or commission me to be your shopper. The cost is about \$25, the same price as the flowers.

During our February meeting we talked about God's command that we love one another. The basic tenet of our faith is to obey this commandment, but it isn't easy and we all fail to love as Jesus loved, unconditionally. We are called to reach out to the stranger in the midst of disasters, stand up to injustice and try to fix the problems of our world even when we know we might fail.

Our program for March is almost a continuation of this theme – becoming better disciples of Christ, and using the time of lent to strive for spiritual growth. Pastor will lead our discussion; Helen Dungan is hostess.

Our main order of business of our March meeting is giving away the soup supper money.

Please join us as we strive to grow in our faith, share fellowship and food, and the joy of giving.

Soup Suppers - Helen Dungan

January we sold 104 quarts of vegetable soup, 82 quarts of potato soup and fed 22 people. Our profits were \$980.68.

Final figures are not yet available for the February soup supper, but we did collect more than \$1,000

We could not make this much money without the generous donations we receive:

First a HUGE thank you to Trauger's Farm Market (Myron and LeeAnn Kressman) who contributed the potatoes, leeks, cabbage in January and the chickens and broccoli in February.

Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburgers (through Mark Harwick) donated the onions, tomato base, crackers and cups.

Other vegetables, chicken, milk, bread and desserts were contributed from the congregation – not to mention the labor!

Our chief chefs, Esther Crouse, Mark Harwick and in February Diane DeWalt, who made the broccoli soup, deserve an especially big thank you. This year we actually froze our own broccoli – so we also thank those who helped with that endeavor. Many people peeled, chopped, baked, washed dishes and pots and pans, served, set up and took down, and cleaned.

Thanks to all of you; this is a huge undertaking which couldn't happen without your help.

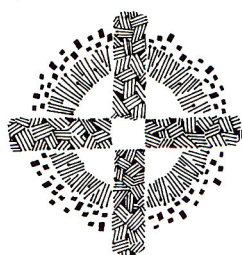
