Want a firm faith foundation? Dig into the WORD!

"Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path ..." (Psalm 119:105)

As Fall of 2012 begins, it would be good to review where we've been so far in this 200th Anniversary Year. It has been a year of celebration and gifts for Evangelical Lutheran Church of Durham. We celebrated the Ascension of Our Lord on May 16, along with many other Christian brothers and sisters from the Upper Bucks Conference. As a result of the hard work of Lynn Gaun, our Anniversary Chair, and many other committed folks, our 200th Anniversary Service and Banquet on June 3 was a great day in our lives and history. Lynn continued to push forward with Christmas in July on July 14. We reached out to the community and offered food, crafts, games, fellowship, and more. Then just a few weeks after that, Val McGinn and Dave Sauter led us in another successful Beef Roast on August 4th. Many of you have put in countless hours to make our 200th Anniversary Year a year to remember.

I'd like to go back to the message that Rev. Jim Moss delivered to us at our Anniversary Banquet. As we go forward in mission and ministry for the next 200 years, we need to be grounded in these words: "Love Jesus and Love People." Rev. Moss elaborated that in order to love Jesus, you need to "know" him. He challenged us to read the Gospels of the New Testament — Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John.

In 2012 and beyond, if we are to remain on firm footing in our decisions and actions as Jesus' disciples, we need to dive into God's Word—The Scriptures, the Bible. September and another autumn season are upon us. It is my hope that all of us this year may accept the invitation and challenge to grow in the Word of God.

You may ask, "But how do I get started?" I have some very practical and simple suggestions: 1. The children of the congregation and of our Care-A-Lot Preschool will be using the Spark Story Bible to experience some of the finest and most exciting stories in the Bible. 2. Parents: There are 150 stories in the Spark Story Bible. If you have one, read them at home with your children. There are questions and suggested activities at the end of each story. If you don't have a Spark Story Bible, let me know, and we will order one for you. 3. If you are part of a family with older children or youth, make daily devotions part of your family life. Pick a Bible Story or Psalm or other Bible passage to read as part of devotions.

Council Corner

Our anniversary year summer has been a busy one. A thousand thanks to all the volunteers at Christmas in July, the Beef Roast, and Vacation Bible School. While not everyone was there every night, V.B.S. had a total of 25 children, six youth helpers, and fourteen adult helpers.

We certainly couldn't have done it without the Naska family, with all four adults playing key roles. Considering that it almost didn't happen at all, there were some 'best one ever' reviews from both children and helpers. We were also blessed with pretty good weather for all of our summer events.

There's been some concern expressed regarding attendance at the Beef Roast, which was about the same as last year when we had pouring rain. It is a very work intensive event. We make about \$1000 in profit, but only because everything except the meat [almost \$600 this year] and the venue are donated by Traugers Market and various volunteers. Suggested changes have included moving the date to late July or later August to avoid conflict with Music Fest, but that might cost us some of our core volunteers or usual customer base. We will probably have to raise our price as beef costs will almost certainly be higher due to the midwest drought. We might consider a discount for tickets sold in advance. If you have suggestions, please pass them on to me or to Dave Sauter. Of course, suggestions will get more attention if you also offer to help implement them.

Work has already started on the first phase, prepping and freezing vegetables [donated by Traugers], for the Community Dinner at the Riegelsville Firehouse sponsored jointly by area churches. Nancy Fox made some phone calls and assured that ELC Durham had a good turnout. Joe Hlavaty and Nancy will be our contact people for this worthy cause.

Some Words About Social Media ... from a concerned and caring, if largely unplugged, pastor

"Have you heard the latest?"

It used to be that these questions came in person-to-person, face-to-face contact. But now the question usually refers to an email or something on a Facebook page, a blog, or a Tweet. The email or whatever may begin with "Have you heard the latest? The government is issuing free cell phones to poor people at NO expense to them ...". Or, "The government is planning to remove nearly a trillion dollars from Medicare bene-fits...". Or "President Obama is a Muslim, non-citizen, socialist, dangerous figure, who is out to destroy our freedom and our nation."

Now, those of you reading this who know me, know that I am not getting these messages via computer, since I am either backward enough or smart enough not to own or use a PC. But, occasionally, other clergy, congregational members, or my wife will share these messages with me. So, I get some forwarded emails.

Many of them may be sent to you with a request to forward them to others. It is becoming more and more clear to me that these cyberspace messages are an ultramodern equivalent of backyard gossip. They are passed on as truth or fact, many times with no way to verify, and no basis in the facts. Remember the old game, *Whisper Down the Lane*, and how muddled the message can become at the end of the line.

In our time of lightning fast technology, fears, lies, and innuendo can spread like wildfire. It is difficult for me to place any stock in the truth of such communications, whether they come from the right or the left of the political spectrum.

These days, many of us are struggling with fewer resources and lots of fear. It's human nature to blame others for circumstances that seem overwhelming. It's particularly easy to blame our societal institutions (government, schools, banks, and corporations), who seem far away and detached. There are lots of emails about government abuses, bizarre events, the weather, "Jesus," the "Bible," and yes, the "Church" and its leaders.

God's people should realize that when we resend or repeat a statement that we cannot verify or that will only harm others, we are breaking the 8th Commandment: "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor." Martin Luther, in his small catechism, went on to say, "We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors [even those far away in Washington, D.C.], betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead, we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light." Further, Jesus himself and St. Paul witnessed against gossip, slander, bitterness in the early Church.

My advice to me and to you, if you receive such communications, is to try www.factcheck.org or www.snopes.com (I didn't know that, but I got that useful info from my very wise wife, Donna). If you have a question about Jesus, the Bible, or the Church, go to your pastor. Too many uninformed, uneducated people on the television make claims about our faith, and they do not have the best interests of people at heart, just their own need for attention.

When a friend or neighbor or work associate approaches you with a rumor, you might pass this article along to them to read, put the best construction on your neighbor's intentions, and on our life in community. I need to be totally honest with you. If you show me a copy of an email like this, I will not pass it on, I will not include it in the newsletter, and I will very likely just place it in the roundfile.

It is very highly-charged election year in our nation. All of us have strong opinions and beliefs. Can we at least consider the possibility that we may not "know" or that we may be "wrong." Only God is all-knowing. We need to read and listen and watch and vote in faith, trusting in our ability to think through any rumor that might lead us astray. And especially, we need to trust in our Lord and be guided by his spirit.
