Is Jesus a Republican or a Democrat?

Who would Jesus support in our upcoming elections? What about God, his Father? This is a question frequently tossed around by those on all sides of the political spectrum - especially every four years. It's electioneering gone wild! There are paid ads, charges, countercharges, spin, fact-checking, back-tracking, all sometimes resulting in chaos and confusion for us voters.

In answer to the question I raised in the title of this article, I feel confident in asserting that Jesus is neither Republican, Democrat, or Independent. My answer is informed by the Word of God as it is proclaimed in Holy Scripture. In no place of the old and New Testaments does the Lord or God's Son endorse a political party or ideology. Once when Jesus is asked a seemingly pertinent question about the payment of taxes, he answers: "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's." In other words, Jesus was not sent to support a king or governor or emperor or president. These political figures who ascend to their position by either force or the choice of people reflect human opinions, aspirations, and ideologies. And all of these things are tinged by human sinfulness, ambition, selfishness, and so forth. Our election on November 6, 2012, is no different. All of our candidates at every level are human, fallible, sinful men and women. And not one reflects the perfect, holy values of God.

Jesus came to bring forth the Kingdom of God, not democracy or theocracy, not capitalism or socialism, but the Kingdom of God, with its own set of values, which frequently clash with our ideas and values. Having said all that, I nevertheless want to urge all of us to pray about our vote and to be informed by the values of our faith, which are the values of the Kingdom of God.

From the Ten Commandments to the Prophets of Israel, to the words and teaching and actions of Jesus, there are certain core values that address and challenge people of faith. They include respect for the creation, care and concern for the neighbor, especially "the least of these," a desire for peace, and **love."**

After a very busy but crisis-free summer, Council met on September 11th to discover that CAL teachers were reporting a recurrence of the water problem we had last spring, with a strong odor and very poor pressure. We thought we had solved the contamination issue by the installation of an ultraviolet system as test results had been fine, but this latest episode indicates we can no longer rely on our spring for safe water.

Therefore, we scheduled a congregational meeting for September 30th in order to facilitate a solution. Meanwhile we operate under the severe handicap of only being able to use our water to flush toilets. This is especially difficult for our preschool. Please say a prayer for three resourceful women who are coping with sixteen little ones with bottled water and hand sanitizer. Our custodians, Altar Guild, Sunday School, and WELCA will also be dealing with challenges, and there are upcoming events that will require hospitality. While we know a well has been attempted previously, Council sees no other viable options. At least we can borrow from ourselves, not China, to finance it, thanks to Mrs. Shaefer.

Let's all pray that clean water flows again in time for our Durham Day Sing-a-Long Concert on October 13th and the All Saints Day service with Bishop Burkat on November 4th as we continue to celebrate 200 years of sharing God's love.
