"The Clash Culminates on the Cross"

Our Lenten scriptures have highlighted the great cosmic clash between the will of God and our own sinful wills. God wills a loving relationship, love of God and love of neighbor, obedience to those things that make for harmony, a search for service rather than a search for power or greatness, forgiveness rather than vengeance. The devil, the world, and our own sinful selves will service to self alone, acquiring more possessions, lording it over those around us. The Word of God proclaims that God's will leads to life while our sinful wills lead to disharmony and death.

The great clash of wills culminates in the Church during the "Three Holy Days" (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter morning.) The clash is fierce. Jesus remains obedient to God's will, is conspired against, denied, betrayed, arrested, and executed innocently on a Roman cross. But God's will prevails as dramatically seen at an empty tomb. "Goodness is stronger than evil. Love is stronger than hate." (ELW Hymn #721) And through Jesus' lifegiving service and passion, we are given life.

As witnesses of this clash and God's victory through the Scriptures and through our participation in the Church, we are called to choose the things that are God's: Goodness, forgiveness, compassion, mercy, and peace. You are called to worship this month, to an experience of the clash and the results of that clash. The cross is the place of final battle. Resurrection is the beginning of a new life for us and the world.



Your Eyes and the Sun



UV radiation, whether from natural sunlight or artificial rays can damage the eye's surface tissue, as well as, the cornea and lens. Studies have also shown that people in the snowy outdoors, especially skiers and snow-boarders, not wearing protective lenses, showed symptoms of eye damage (cornea) and disease. The highest levels of UV rays were in the late winter and early spring and that reflection of the sun off the snow intensified the rays.

Some researchers suggest that the light-sensitive cells in the eyes are important in regulating the wake-sleep cycles. As we age, more people have problems with insomnia. Though it is important to protect the eyes from overexposure to UV light, the eyes also need minimal exposure to natural light to help maintain normal sleep-wake cycles. Minimizing light from lamps and the television is essential. Researchers also warn that looking directly into a solar eclipse is as dangerous as looking directly into an unblocked sun and can cause damage to the retina.

Protect your eyes from the sun by:

- *using wraparound sunglasses that block UV rays (100%),
- *wear hats,
- *don't rely on UV protected contact lenses, wear sun glasses as well,
- *don't be fooled by clouds, sun rays can pass through them,
- *never look directly into the sun, and
- *protect all ages, children through seniors.

Malaria Campaign of the ELCA - Presentation at Evangelical, Durham on March 3, 2013

In the summer of 2011, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America voted to join Christians throughout the world in defeating Malaria. Our SEPA Synod Youth Malaria Education Team will spend all of Sunday morning, March 3, with our congregation. They will lead a children's education program during the Spark Sunday School hour. Then they will present a Temple Talk during our 10:30 worship service.

Some facts about Malaria:

- Malaria causes 200 to 250 million illnesses per year and kills more than 800,000 annually mostly children under 5.
- Malaria is a leading cause of death in Africa, claiming the life of a child every 45 seconds.
- A simple insecticide-treated bed net creates a protective barrier against infected mosquitoes for up to 5 years for those who sleep under it.
- The Malaria Campaign of the ELCA since 2011 has realized positive results among Lutheran churches in Angola, Malawi, Mozambique, Nigeria, Tanzania, Zambia, and Zimbabwe by distributing mosquito nets and medicine as well as educating communities about prevention.
- The average cost of \$5-\$10 per net is beyond the reach of most people threatened by malaria, who may survive on an average of \$1 per day.
- The goal of the ELCA's Malaria Campaign is to raise \$15 million by the year 2013 from all the congregations of the ELCA and to work directly with our companion churches in Africa to prevent and treat malaria.

March 2013 is our kick-off to support this campaign. Please give \$\$\$ generously to help. There are 2 ways you can give: 1.) Place your cash your check in a separate plain envelope, clearly marked "ELCA Malaria Campaign 2.) Use the "Good Neighbor" envelope in your 2013 offering envelop box. Write "ELCA Malaria Campaign" on the outside of that envelope and on your check.

We will continue this campaign throughout the Lenten/Easter Season .

Spring is just around the corner and we can't wait! This month we are "Wild About Transportation" so we will be learning about vehicles and how they move.





The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!"

The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." -- John 1:35-39

Jesus said to them: "Come and see." It is an invitation.

Have you ever been to a new restaurant and half way through the

meal you knew you just had to tell your friends about it? You give them all the details about location, food specialties, price and ambience. You tell them exactly why they should try out this place and you might even suggest that you go together.

Have you ever shared with a friend or neighbor the specifics about a particular product brand? You might mention its reliability, quality, effectiveness and value. And you do it without hesitation or awkwardness. You do it with enthusiasm and confidence; you know they need this product.

Have you ever wondered why you don't give the same kind of endorsement or invitation to friends and neighbors about your church? Our excuse is often that we don't like to bring up religion because it makes people feel uncomfortable. But...maybe we are the ones who are uncomfortable?

Research has shown that people are more likely to try a church if invited by a friend or relative. If the pastor asks them to come, it is *their job* to ask; when a friend asks it is a genuine invitation. That is why some congregations have an official "Bring a Friend to church" Sunday a couple times a year. It allows for you to be intentional about the invitation and helps you articulate just what it is about your specific congregation that "feeds" you. You might speak about the music or the community that surrounds and supports you. Maybe you love the sermons or the opportunities for faith formation and outreach; whatever it is tell others.

If there is anything that this world is desperately in need of it is a relationship with God-in-Christ. In most respects this can only be fully found in a church where the Word of God is proclaimed and the Sacraments are administered. I say that because good music and community can be found in others places as well, but not Word and Sacrament, **and** those other things. Is that your church? Is it a faith community that you want all those you care about to be part of? Then invite others to "come and see." Such an invitation could change their life and yours.

Consider inviting others to "come and see" on a regular basis and if you don't think it is a good and faithful congregation, give some prayerful thought to what *you* might do to help make it one. After all, your friends deserve the best -- and it doesn't get better than Jesus.
