Where Would We Be Without that Easter Announcement?





Thanks to our delightful winter, we were forced to postpone the Annual Congregational Meeting. We have rescheduled for April 19th, after worship; too late for snow and too early for hurricane season. Please take a copy of the Annual Report for 2014, and try to get any questions you may have to any Council member so we can provide answers at the meeting. Because we expect the meeting to be brief, and everyone's lives are so busy in the spring, we decided not to reschedule the dinner for this year. Council reorganized as best we could in March, filling the vacancies left by Dave Sauter and George Kreitz with interim appointments of Beth Snyder and Cathy Mueller. Cheryl Mesko's first term expired, but she agreed to stay on for another. Council officers remain the same: Val McGinn, President; Lynn Gaun, Vice-President; Helen Dungan, Secretary; and Beth Snyder, Treasurer.

Our boiler has continued to function despite numerous leaks, thanks to the TLC of Dave Sauter, Mac's Oil Burner Service, and daily monitoring by Pastor. We should now be past any serious danger of frozen pipes during the installation of the new boiler, which is expected to take place this month. We hope it can be accomplished without too much disruption to Care-a-Lot Pre-school.

A new challenge facing us may make it difficult to get enough volunteers for Vacation Bible School this year. Recent legislation requires multiple background checks every three years for all employees and all volunteers who work with children. Most of our Sunday School staff had already submitted a background check, but that is no longer sufficient and the deadline for compliance is July 1st. If you are, or plan to be, one of our Sunday School or Vacation Bible School volunteers, please take a copy of the letter on the table in the Narthex from the Office of the Bishop, which explains the requirements and how to comply. While the new laws are certainly well-intended, it would be sad if we had to cancel VBS for lack of sufficient volunteers to maintain safety.

Palisades Cluster News - Helen Dungan

The Palisades Cluster meet on Sunday March 15, 2015 at Durham. Topics discussed included: **Bear Creek Day Camp** which will be held June 29, 2015-July 3, 2015 at St Peter's Riegelsville. Brochures and registration information will be available after Easter.

CROP Walk for 2015 which will be held October 18th, Pastor Rasmussen requested someone from each church to serve on the work team which will begin its work after Easter.

Code Blue has been averaging 5 people per night which is down from last year. Two of those using the service had gotten temporary housing. Next year they will use the Masonic Temple in Quakertown as the overnight location; it has a shower and is close to the Y which also allows guests to shower 3 days a week. Concerns were raised about its closeness to a school.

They are also going to apply for non profit organization status which will allow them to get insurance. They are looking for a lawyer who will guide them through this process for free.

Child Protection – Pennsylvania has recently passed new legislation regarding protection of children that affect all churches. Under state law clergy, paid staff and volunteers who work with children and youth in any capacity are now “mandated reporters” who must report suspected child abuse directly to authorities. The law also now requires all employees and volunteers who work with children 18 and younger to have background checks every three years. These background checks include Report of criminal history from the Pennsylvania State Police, Child Abuse History Clearance from Department of Human Services, and employees are required to have an FBI Fingerprint clearance. (I am quoting this from the Synod's web page - <http://ministrylink.org/article/churches-child-protection-laws/> if you want more details.) The Synod also suggests speaking to the congregation's legal counsel – Pastor Rex has asked a member of his congregation who is a lawyer to look into this. There is a lot of concern and questions about this.



DIABETES



Diabetes refers to a group of diseases that affect how the body uses sugar (glucose). If you have diabetes, no matter what type, it means there is too much glucose in the blood. Chronic diabetes includes type 1 and type 2 diabetes. There are also potentially reversible diabetic conditions such as pre-diabetes, this is when the blood sugar levels are higher than normal but not high enough to be classified diabetic. Gestational diabetes occurs during pregnancy and may resolve after the baby is born.

Normally, when you eat food it gets broken down and turned into glucose. The glucose is then used for energy within the body and brain. In order to use glucose properly, the body needs a hormone called insulin to transport the glucose out of the blood into the body's organs for energy. This hormone is produced by the pancreas.

Type 1 diabetes (Diabetes Mellitus), once known as juvenile diabetes or insulin dependent Diabetes is an inflammatory autoimmune disease of the pancreas. It is a chronic condition in which the pancreas produces little or no insulin. Type 2 diabetes, is the most common type of diabetes. Either the pancreas cannot produce enough insulin, or the insulin being produced is weak, or the body's cells cannot use it properly. Instead of being transported for energy, that glucose stays in the blood damaging organs and causing health problems. Thus, blood sugar levels in the blood rise. The initial treatment for type 2 diabetes is weight loss, diet, exercise, and basic life style changes. There are oral medications that strengthen the insulin's ability to transport glucose or medications that directly interact with the pancreas' production of insulin. Over time though, the oral route may not be sufficient enough to manage the glucose levels and insulin injections are needed.

Type 1 and type 2 diabetes share similar symptoms. They include: excessive thirst, frequent urination, unexplained weight loss, tingling and numbness in the hands and feet, and blurred vision. The difference between the two is that in type 1 diabetes the pancreas is directly affected by an inflamed auto-immune system causing it to lose the potential to produce insulin or produces insulin too weak to transport. The average age of type 1 diabetes is usually before age 20 and for type 2 diabetes around 45. With an increase in obesity and inactivity the age has been getting younger, often affecting juveniles.
