There were lots of hunters, sportsmen associations, motorcycles -- none of which we were accustomed to in Philadelphia. Another aspect of our world here was the abundance of farmland, gardens, tress, and wildlife (again very uncommon in the city). It was going to be a sea-change for us.


You members who were here in 1995 had gone through a series of short pastorates which had thrown congregational challenges your way. Numbers were down, and many folks had either left for another church or simply slipped away. You had some understandable fear and insecurity about the future. How long would the Deals stay? Would we be able to bring some people back, or attract new people to experience God's grace?

Well, here's what happened: We Deals, and I in particular, have grown to love the environment and the people of Upper Bucks. And I've discovered more similarities than differences in the ministry that needs to be done. People laugh and cry, are born and die, need love and forgiveness, whether city mice or country mice. I've grown to love this community, and especially all of you. And God has given us lots of surprises: a recent growth in young families, children, and others seeking a welcoming and caring community (which all of you have formed here), a tremendous financial gift which has helped to reduce our fear for the future, and, most importantly, a congregational core value of service to others after the example of Christ.

On this, my 20th anniversary of ministry with you, I am so privileged and grateful. And I'm hoping to continue here at least a while longer. As we serve together today and tomorrow, God is prodding us to more outreach with young families, youth and children. God is inviting us to be more open to the cultural changes around us. And God is promising to be with us through it all.

Thank you for calling me and supporting me during these 20 years.

HEADACHES

There isn't anyone who doesn't suffer from a headache now and then. According to the National Headache Foundation, forty-five million people suffer from chronic, recurring headaches every year.

In the following causes of headaches, there are probably some that may surprise you.

1. Heat – Weather can have a large impact on headaches. Heat and humidity are most often associated with headaches, but rain or changes in barometric pressure can be culprits.
2. Dehydration can cause headaches by activating the pain sensitive nerves of the head. The Mayo Clinic recommends that women drink nine cups of fluid a day and men drink thirteen.
3. Stress is a major cause of headaches. Destressing with activities such as yoga or relaxing outdoors has been recommended.
4. Red wine can cause a headache. It contains tyramine, which affects blood vessels causing headaches.
5. Strenuous exercise can cause headaches either during or after the activity. Some of these activities may be running, rowing, swimming, and weight lifting.
6. Smells - Since there is a direct connection to the brain certain smells may be a trigger for headaches. Such smells may be perfume, paint, or flowers.
7. Bad posture – “Slouching” or having bad posture will build up pressure in the head and neck muscles leading to headaches.
8. Caffeine withdrawal- The National Headache Foundation states that caffeine withdrawal will occur “after consuming more than 200 mg of caffeine per day for at least two weeks.” It is recommended to slowly decrease caffeine intake, rather than stopping abruptly.
9. Cured/Smoked meats contain tyramine and nitrates that can trigger headaches. This includes cold cuts and processed meats.
10. Cheese – Eating aged cheeses such as cheddar, blue, and Swiss can be triggers. They also contain tyramine.
11. Bright or flashing lights may not be the primary cause of a headache but seem to worsen an existing one. (Mayo Clinic.com)

October is Breast Cancer and Prostate Cancer Awareness Month and is a good time to schedule those screenings to detect these cancers.
