

We sold 132 quarts of vegetable and 85 quarts of potato; we had 33 adults for dinner plus 1 older child and 2 younger ones.

Once again we sold out of soup. Our final profits, which included some donations, were \$1308.17. **Thank you to everyone who helped with this project:**

Palisades Cluster News

PACT (Partners in Action for Community Togetherness): Emily French, Community Mobilizer, spoke about the drug and alcohol abuse problems in the community. She spoke about PACT's Strengthening Families program which is geared to youth Aged 10-14 and aims to help them learn to make wise decisions and how to say no without alienating their friends. The next set of 7 classes begins March 7, 2016. The classes are free but registration is required. (see page 11) She also talked about their programs aimed at preventing substance abuse. Bucks County has a high incidence of drug and alcohol abuse - a combination of money and location. Opiate use for pain is a frequent precursor to the use of heroin. There will be a presentation on Monday February 1, 2016 by doctors from St. Luke's Health Network and Penn Foundation beginning at 7:00 PM in the Palisades High School auditorium discussing this.

Bear Creek Day Camp: The camp will be held the week of June 27, 2016 at Trinity Pleasant Valley. More information will follow.

CROP Walk: Pastor Rasmussen announced he had under estimated the length of last fall's walk – it was 5 miles not 3! Christ Lutheran Church in Hellertown may be interested in joining us next year; we will also invite New Jerusalem. Times and location of the walk will be decided later (the trail in Hellertown being another possibility.) Planning meetings will begin after Easter.

Code Blue: Linda Frey praised the great volunteers who are helping staff the shelter. They are interacting with the guests at the shelter who frequently want to talk. AHUB would like to expand their services so that the shelter can be open till 9:00 AM; currently it closes at 7:00 AM.

Building Repairs Assistance: Bucks County Habitat for Humanity offers low cost assistance for exterior home repairs – including handicapped ramps – for residents of the county whose income is below the county's average. There is also government funded weatherization help available for low income residents. Home Depot is helping veterans with building repairs for free.

Advertisements: The Cluster voted to not run joint Christmas & Easter advertisements this year.

Youth: About 25 youth and adults attended the first planning committee for Cluster Youth. Three events were scheduled in the fall – the CROP Walk; SleepOUT for Homelessness (17 attendees)) and Christmas caroling (15 attendees). Coming up is skating at the Steel Ice Arena; worship and dinner with students at Muhlenberg College; and on Sunday June 12, 2016 a trip to see the Iron Pigs. The Iron Pigs trip is open to all members of the Cluster. They are looking into reserving the picnic area. Upper Bucks Conference is organizing a youth mission trip; the information meeting was being held simultaneously with the Cluster's meeting. Pastor Hopke is the organizer; she has reserved spaces for 15 youth and 5 adults to participate.

Upper Bucks Conference Announcements:

The Conference's Spring Assembly will be held March 6, 2016 at 2:00 PM at St Michaels' Sellersville. There are 5 at large openings on the Synod Council for which we can make nominations. They are hoping to have Pastor Jennifer Ollikainen speak on immigration and refugee settlement at the meeting.

LENT 2016 - A Season to Remember

On Thursday evenings, the communities of Trinity Lutheran, Pleasant Valley; Christ Lutheran, Springtown; St Luke Lutheran, Ferndale; ELC of Durham; and possibly St. Peter's Lutheran, Riegelsville, will gather for a brief time of light refreshment and fellowship, followed by worship.

The upcoming month is sure to bring tons of fun to Care-A-Lot. In February, we will begin our exploration of size and measurement in math. Tracing our bodies, comparing our height, learning about different forms of measurement will be exciting for our preschoolers! All will have an opportunity to use a ruler and to

measure items in the classroom. We will talk about which items are smaller, bigger, and longer than others. Additionally, we will incorporate this lesson into our snack preparation by using measuring cups and measuring spoons when we create in the kitchen. Expanding the lesson, we will discuss what can happen if we don't use precise measurements when cooking or baking!

Our science lesson will include simple tools such as the lever, pulley, wedge, wheel and axle and inclined plane. We will discuss how we use these tools every day to make our lives easier. We will do hands-on experiments using these tools!

Our Christian theme of "Love and Trust" comes at a perfect time as we celebrate Valentine's Day in February. We will read books about the love we share with our families, friends, classmates, neighbors and pets and our arts and crafts will coincide with the holiday. We will discuss and reflect on the greatest love we all experience which is God's love!

Mission Trip Report - Building a Church in Tulum, Mexico – Mary Crouse

Once again I was fortunate to have a wonderful experience with a different culture and some very appreciative people. The Pastor and his congregation of Solo Cristo Salva were so kind. I was in Tulum, Mexico from January 10-17. The weather was in the 80's and there was a fair amount of rain. We were fortunate to have seasoned block layers, which allowed us to complete the majority of the walls on the first floor.



I participated in sand sifting (for mixing mortar); rebarring; cleaning boards (these are used for forms & are reused); there was a lot of block moving and clean up. I was so impressed how much our group accomplished! Our group consisted of 7 of us from Discovery Services and five native workers. The Pastor and a few of his parishioners also stopped in and helped as they were able. The meals were incredible! We had a Mexican cook, he and the Pastor's wife made us real Mexican meals. Each meal surpassed the last! Our lodging was in a hotel - Hotel Ghia. The rooms are made from shipping crates. They are very narrow and small, but they were very clean. The hotel was constructed a year ago in November. Using shipping crates is a new concept for Mexico.

It was a true pleasure working on this project. The night before we left, the congregation made us a turkey dinner. There were prayers offered, music played, and also some games. They also presented us with small gifts, as a token of their appreciation. I feel very blessed to have had another self-enriching experience serving others!



February is American Heart Month and Friday, February 5th, is "Wear Red Day". This campaign has educated both men and women on the different symptoms they may experience having a heart attack. In ten years since the campaign began, 34% fewer women died from heart disease each year. 23% more women are aware of the health risks and more than

627,000 women's lives have been saved.

For both men and women action, taken within three hours after symptoms of a heart attack appear, could save a life. Also, taking an aspirin at the onset of symptoms may prevent the formation of clots. One should crush or chew and then swallow the aspirin. Aspirin **should not** be taken if one is taking anticoagulants (blood thinners) or there is an allergy to aspirin. Never feel that any symptom is a "false alarm" and will go away. Call 911 or go to a hospital immediately as prevention and/or immediate treatment is the best defense.
