"Blessed are You ... "

This is quite a challenge in our self-centered, proud, violent, disrespectful world --- and maybe in our own minds and hearts. These next several Sunday mornings will indeed challenge each of us and the Church as a whole to live as Jesus called us to live: "...as the children of God."

Code Blue/AHUB: Linda Frey said the Code Blue shelter needs **male** volunteers to cover the night shifts. There are two night shifts, each needs 1 male and 1 female. The women are not being called to serve as often as the men because there are more volunteers. To ease the commitments being placed on the current male volunteers, more male volunteers are needed.

Bear Creek Day Camp: Pastor Rasmussen announced that the request to reserve the last week in June for our Bear Creek Day camp was submitted; we haven't had the date confirmed yet.

Upper Bucks Conference stewardship learning event Fear to Faithfulness: Pastor Deal spoke on the Upper Bucks Conference learning event which focuses on Stewardship and will be held on Saturday, January 28th at St. Matthew's, Keller's Church; Dr. Richard Steward will be the key note speaker.

Cluster's purpose: We continued to discuss this and the role of the Cluster and decided on the following beginning steps:

- 1. To try and gather insights from our congregations on what they want from the church and where they see the churches' ministries going. We are asking each church to hold this conversation as part of their council meeting polling their church's leadership.
 - We are also going to try to have some social gatherings spread geographically over the Cluster where we can have fellowship (building community) and informally discuss this. - 2. The other opportunity for community involvement is baccalaureate. Pastor Deal will speak to Ann Wong and Carolyn Williams; get a list of all Palisades churches; find out which churches have students graduating; and begin the process of preparing for this service. It was decided the pastors could do this without the cluster as a whole meeting on the topic.
- 3. The third opportunity is a speaker on the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Pastor Deal will make arrangements and notify the cluster churches of this shared event.





MANAGING MEDICATIONS

The National Institution of Health states, that more than eighty percent of older adults (aged 57 to 85 years) take at least one prescription medication daily. They also noted that more than fifty percent take more than five medications or supplements a day. The high rate of multiple, chronic illnesses, age related drug metabolism and drug interactions potentially lead to health issues unrelated to what the medication was



prescribed for. Furthermore, a large percent of this population also uses over the counter medications and dietary supplements that could compound their health.

Also noted, that when people age they become more susceptible to delirium and dementia caused by drugs. This is known as "drug-induced cognitive impairment" and, if recognized as such, can be reversed or returned to the pre-drug state by stopping the offending drug. Often this impairment is attributed to old age or an illness, when actually it may be a side effect of a drug or taking multiple drugs at once. Three reasons older people are more susceptible to drug induced delirium and dementia are: 1. The body's ability to clear drugs decreases with age as there is an age-related decrease in the kidneys and liver. This results in a greater accumulation of drugs in the body. 2. Multiple drugs are often prescribed at the same time. Often complicated interactions occur and side effects become more pronounced. 3. Some research indicates that the brain's transmitters, with age, become naturally imbalanced. This increases the brain's sensitivity to certain drugs. The following are drugs that can cause cognitive impairment: Opiates (narcotics, pain medications), Tricyclics Antidepressants (used for pain, depression, and anxiety), Benzodiazepines (tranquillizers, sleeping pills) and stopping these drugs abruptly may cause a withdrawal syndrome.

Knowing the difference between deliri- um and dementia can help determine if it may be a drug-induced problem. Delirium is a change in attention perception (i.e. vision and hearing) and thinking. It usually starts abruptly and the most common causes are acute medical illnesses (i.e. serious infection) and medications. Dementia is a chronic alteration in thinking that sometimes progresses over a course of months, even years. Alzheimer's disease is the most common cause, but other conditions such as strokes can cause it. Drugs may also be a cause or can worsen the condition. Unlike most of the medical causes for dementia, which are irreversible, stopping a drug that may be the cause can lead to improvement.


