"From Division to Repentance to Restoration "

The forty days of Lent are about to begin on February 14. Traditionally, Lent has been a time for repentance, self-denial, and preparation for God's great gift of salvation, dispensed from a cross and an empty tomb. This year, I would like to suggest to you a slightly different way to look at this time.

Division! Division - within us, around us, all over the world - keeps us from being the people God created us to be. We are prevented from enjoying the connected, united community God intended for us. Division breaks us apart inside and erects barriers between us and God, and between us and our neighbors.

Where does all this division come from? Our own self-centeredness and self-righteousness, a desire to go it alone, without God, a fear of people and ideas that are different—all these things divide us. The Bible would call all this "sin."

The Lenten Season gives us an opportunity to be open and honest about this division. We will look inside ourselves to confess our personal sin and division. We will look at the national, political, racial, cultural, and religious division in the world that is breaking our hearts. And we begin the saving process of renewal to restore ourselves to God, to one another, and to the world.

Being split, divided, apart doesn't feel good. Being forgiven and reunited brings us great joy. I pray that you as an individual and we as a community of faith will God to "un-divide" us. This is not an easy job. That's why Jesus had to suffer and die on a cross. This is God's will and mission for us.

OPIODS

We've all been reading or hearing about the Opioid crisis exploding throughout our country. For each of us, the consumer, the patient, or the caregiver, it is important that we know how to use medications safely. Prescription pain relievers (narcotics / opioids), antidepressants, and stimulants are safe and effective when used correctly for specific medical conditions and under a healthcare provider's supervision. But when



they are not used correctly, they can cause serious side effects and can lead to abuse, addiction, and even death.

The National Institute on Drug Abuse states "misuse of prescription drugs means taking a medication in a manner or a dose other than prescribed, even if for a legitimate medical complaint such as pain or to induce euphoria (to get high)." The three classes of medications most commonly misused are: 1. Opioids – used to treat pain 2. Central Nervous System (CNS) medications: antidepressants, sedation/ tranquilizers for anxiety and sleep disorders, and 3. Stimulants – used to treat Attention Deficit Disorders.

The safety of using these medications with other substances needs to be monitored for side effects. Misuse of prescription drugs affect many, but certain populations such as youth, older adults, and women seem to be at a particular risk. Pregnant women taking these drugs increase the baby's risk of developing birth defects or a dependence on the drugs. Healthcare providers, pharmacists, and patients all can play a role in identifying and preventing misuse of prescription drugs.

Researchers are exploring alternative treatment approaches to conditions such as pain management, anxiety, and sleep disorders. We, the consumer, have to be knowledgeable of drug interactions, side effects, and possibilities for misuse. Websites such as: Partnership for Drug Free Kids and <u>www.drugabuse.gov</u> are excellent resources.
