"Destructive National Division vs God's Will for Unity and Peace"

November 6, 2018!!! You may or may not have heard that this may be the most important date for American citizens in our lifetime. It is U.S. Election Day for the Mid-term Elections. It is just five days after one the holiest days for every Christian - All Saint's Day, when we celebrate the sainthood bestowed on us in Baptism. And our Holy Baptism calls us to do God's holy will in every aspect of our lives - including our lives as national citizens.

Carrying out our responsibility and voting is not easy. It is often messy and unclear. It is especially messy this year when it seems to so many of us that there is nothing but disagreement, division, and nastiness all around us. Division around politics and political opinion has invaded our families, our workplaces, our communities, and our communities of faith. Many times, it seems as if we are unable to listen or talk to those with different political allegiances. This division has so affected us that we are tempted to stop talking, to stop associating with those with whom we disagree. We may even be tempted to drop out of the civic realm altogether. We may even decide not to vote.

Before November 6 gets here, it seems as though, as baptized Christians, we ought to at least try to ask about God's will for our actions as citizens of the U.S.A. After all, there can be no doubt that our ultimate allegiance is not to political party, political ideology, or any government official, but to God alone. Can the Word of God inform our response to this tense moment in our nation and culture? Let me cite two portions of Scripture and some words of our denomination's namesake, Martin Luther.

- John 17:11b (Jesus prays to God for his followers before he goes to the Cross) "Holy Father, protect them in your love that you have given me, so that they may be *one*, as we are one."
- Ephesians 4:1-3)St. Paul writes to Christians in the Ephesian Church) "I, therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."



West Nile Virus

A wet, hot summer has made the country susceptible to an increase in the mosquito population. Mosquito breeding starts in the summer and continues into the fall. One virus caused by a mosquito bite to a human, is the West Nile Virus. Cases have been reported in all of the United States. Unfortunately there are no vaccines to prevent it or medications to treat it.



Fortunately, though, most people infected do not have symptoms or their symptoms are mild. One in five people who are infected develop a fever and other mild symptoms. About one in a hundred and fifty develops serious symptoms. Mild symptoms include: fever, headache, body aches, nausea/vomiting, diarrhea, fatigue and possibly a rash. These symptoms are similar to the flu and usually subside in a few days. The more serious symptoms require immediate medical attention and are: high fever, severe headache, stiff neck, disorientation/confusion, stupor, tremors or muscle weakness. Incubation from the bite ranges from two to fourteen days.

To reduce the risk of a bite, use insect repellent and wear long-sleeved shirts and pants. The peak time for mosquitoes is early morning and dusk. Also, standing water and dense wooded areas provide breeding places for them.

Our Christian theme for November with Pastor Dave is "Who Are We Thankful For". We'll also be learning about food/growth, manners and opposites.

The students, parents and staff would like to say "THANK YOU" to the church members for all of the supplies that were donated to Care-A-Lot. September meeting: Our tour of the **Easton food bank** was really informative. They are one of seven foodbanks in the Easton area; who cooperate so that there is a food bank open every day. ProJeCt, because they are manned four days a week, gets the most drop in people with needs. To use the foodbank you have to be a resident of Northampton County and have an income below a certain level. You can use any of the 7 foodbanks once a week. They also serve homeless people with added supplies like blankets, sternos, socks and gloves.

Donations of food comes from local churches and organizations; stores and individuals. They also receive food from Second Harvest (Upper Bucks receives food from Philabundance.) They have one paid employee, all the rest are volunteers. They get fresh meat, fresh bread and dairy products. What they do not get much of are personal care items – including toilet paper. They have a shelf for these, and a person can have **one** item each month. We are going to collect toilet paper and personal care items for them in October.

Pastor's Message ... Continued

It seems clear that our Lord desires that we be united as human beings and not divided by our political beliefs. This doesn't mean that we can't have different ideas about government and political policy. It <u>does</u> mean that we dare not dismiss other human beings because of our differences. We are not allowed to devalue Republicans or Democrats or Independents because of what they believe. Instead, I believe God is calling on us in 2018 not to disconnect from each other. Let's listen to all sides. Let's disagree without being disagreeable, prideful, or impatient. After all, we pledge allegiance to "<u>One</u> Nation under God." If we take these actions to reverse destructive national division, we will be taking Christlike actions.

• Martin Luther, in his explanation of the Fourth Commandment in the Small and Large Catechism, lists government as one of God's gifts of "Daily Bread" to us. Good government does good things for human beings under national authority. We are not to view government as "inherently evil." Certainly, since government involves human leaders, it is imperfect and sometimes sinful. Yet, we need government for good order and necessary services. For us, the governed, to decide that we're just fed up with presidents, governors, legislators, and judges to the extent that we're ready to drop out of the system, is not a godly action for the Christian citizen. The process is messy and imperfect. But it is still possible for government to do good and just and compassionate things for its citizens.



There's about a month left before November 6 - Election Day. It's not too late for us as Christian citizens to pray about our responsibility. This is what I think God would want us to do. God would want us to study honestly candidates and issues. God would want us to vote for those who seem to want to help the least of these - those who need the most help - the hungry, the poor, the homeless, those who are un- or under-employed, and others who lack power. God would then want us to dare to vote, even if we cannot

find the perfect candidate. This is what I'm planning to do in the weeks ahead. I urge you to join me in this important Christian responsibility.
