First Reading- Numbers 11: 4-6, 10-16, 24-29

The rabble among them had a strong craving; and the Israelites also wept again, and said, "If only we had meat to eat! We remember the fish we used to eat in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic; but now our strength is dried up, and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at."

Moses heard the people weeping throughout their families, all at the entrances of their tents. Then the LORD became very angry, and Moses was displeased. So Moses said to the LORD, "Why have you treated your servant so badly? Why have I not found favor in your sight, that you lay the burden of all this people on me? Did I conceive all this people? Did I give birth to them, that you should say to me, 'Carry them in your bosom, as a nurse carries a sucking child', to the land that you promised on oath to their ancestors? Where am I to get meat to give to all this people? For they come weeping to me and say, 'Give us meat to eat!' I am not able to carry all this people alone, for they are too heavy for me. If this is the way you are going to treat me, put me to death at once—if I have found favor in your sight—and do not let me see my misery."

So the LORD said to Moses, "Gather for me seventy of the elders of Israel, whom you know to be the elders of the people and officers over them; bring them to the tent of meeting, and have them take their place there with you."

PASTOR DAVID M DEAL

A Summary of his life and ministry:

Born: October 5, 1951, at Tokyo (Japan) Sanitarium Hospital

Baptized: October 23, 1951, at Tokyo Lutheran Seminary, by Rev. Roy Fisher

David was the child of missionary parents. His father, Rev. Harold G. Deal, and mother, Miriam M. Deal, served 3 terms in Japan, between 1947 and 1959. David's brother, Stephen, was born in North Carolina on a furlough. And his sister Carol was born in Kyoto, Japan. After going back and forth across the ocean a few times, David and his family came back to the United States for good in 1959, when David was 7.

David's father then served as a Lutheran pastor in Houston, Texas; Orlando, Florida and Pensacola, Florida. David attended multiple elementary, junior high, and high schools in North Carolina, Texas and Florida. David graduated from Pensacola H.S. in 1969.

David attended Lenoir Rhyne College (affiliated with the ELCA) from 1969-1973. He was an English Major, but also a pre-theological student. He enrolled in the Lutheran School of Theology, where he prepared for the ordained ministry, from 1973-1977. While in seminary, he met a young woman, Donna Taterka, who was an active member of Reformation Lutheran on the south side of Chicago. Donna was also a founding teacher in a Lutheran parochial school at Reformation. David was assigned to do field education at Donna's congregation. They dated sometimes in-person, but often by phone, especially when David was serving an internship in Philadelphia.

David graduated from LSTC in the Spring of 1977. He and Donna were married in Chicago June 25, 1977. David was ordained by the Florida Synod at St. Paul Lutheran, Pensacola, Fla. (where his father was pastor) on July 24, 1977. Very soon, David and Donna would be coming to Philadelphia for David's first call.

David's first call was to Zion Lutheran in Olney (North Philadelphia), as an assistant pastor. He served Zion from 1977-1979. He was then called as the pastor of Advocate Lutheran in N.W. Philadelphia. David served Advocate for 5 ½ years, from 1979-1984. While living in N.W. Philadelphia, Donna and David were blessed by the birth of Sarah Elizabeth, July 11, 1982. David's next call was to Trinity Lutheran in Yeadon (Delaware County) where he served from 1984-1995.

In the meantime, Donna, who had been a parochial teacher for several years, before and after she met David, felt called to attend the Lutheran Seminary in Mt. Airy, Philadelphia. She would complete her preparations for the ordained ministry in 1994. After waiting awhile for a call near Yeadon, Donna and David were offered the opportunity to move to a "new demographic land," Upper Bucks County, where they would jointly serve St. Luke's Lutheran, Ferndale and Evangelical Lutheran Church of Durham.

The Deals' joint call ended in 1999. Donna would take a call back to Zion Lutheran in Philadelphia where David had started. She was later called in the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, where she would serve congregations in Western Salisbury and Allentown (Redeemer) until retirement in 2019. In 1999, ELCD decided to call David as the pastor there. David has continued to serve their congregation for a total of 26 years.

Before coming to Upper Bucks, David and Donna had been city folk. It was going to be an adjustment to leave the city. But both quickly discovered that the spiritual needs of children, youth, and adults are not that different- whether folks live in cities, suburbs or small towns. Pastor David Deal has been blessed to serve this congregation for 26 years. He is grateful for the support, the partnership, the commitment to ministry, members have demonstrated. It will not be easy to end such a relationship. But God will continue to bless David and Donna, even as God will bless all of you. We give God the glory for all we have experienced together!
