Pastor's Message:

Dear Evangel Family,

Last Sunday two things happened which made me think. The first was part of the Gospel reading from John 12, verse 20 "Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks." The second thing happened at Confirmation Class that evening. I asked the youth how they would feel about planning and leading a Sunday morning worship service (call it a youth Sunday if we must). Their response was less than enthusiastic. So I modified my question: "What would you change about our worship if you could?" Their responses were more energetic. They wanted to make the service at 11:00 or later. They wanted to get rid of the hymns and to no one's surprise, they wanted to do away with the sermon (my feelings were only slightly hurt). That verse from the morning and the confirmands response to my question about worship style led me to think about our worship structure and format.

Now before I go any further, let me be perfectly clear. I am not going to suggest we totally throw out our current worship liturgy. While I remember feeling just like the confirmands when I was their age, I have grown to love and appreciate the Lutheran Liturgical format. Yet at the same time, I also know the some of my most memorable worship experiences were not in structured churches on Sunday mornings. I think about the worship services around the campfire at summer camp, or the wonderful worship opportunities I have experienced at worship conferences or at Synod gatherings. But I do also know that I look forward to our regular Sunday worship each week as a way of gathering with God and family; as a time of confession, absolution, being feed with both word and meal which offers me renewal and strength for the week ahead.

So what's the issue? While I love worship, I was reminded this past week that not everyone feels about worship as I do. While I hold it as a deep responsibility to help grow the church's understanding, appreciation, and participation in worship, I also recognize that we don't all share the same sense of taste. In particular, I was made to think about how visitors to our worship (or modern day "Greeks") might respond as they came to our worship. This is an even broader issue when you consider that most people today who are church shopping, do so online. How does our worship translate online? Add to these our young confirmands' thoughts about worship, we are forced to acknowledge that our worship, as it is currently practiced, isn't reaching them. So what are we to do?

You already know that I am not one to do the same thing over and over every week. You have already discovered my pattern of changing the liturgical setting with the change in season as a means to remind us about the different emphasis each season.

And you also saw me change the creed in Epiphany season to use the one the confirmands wrote. I can let you know that I will continue to make similar changes. For example, in Easter Season we will be using the alternate translation of the Lord's Prayer. Now I know this might be a touchy one for some, but it is also a recognition that the language of faith in the Lutheran tradition has always been to worship in the language of the people, and that is no longer the King's English. This does not mean that we will never use the old version again, but it is to keep us mindful of the different tastes of different generations. I will also take this opportunity to warn you that I will continue to make adjustments to our worship. In fact, if you have ideas or a suggestion about a change, my door is always open (my phone and email are always available).

Please keep in mind that our worship life is not just for those who are already here, it is also to be an open welcoming place offering invitation for all those "Greeks" both young and old, to come to know Jesus and feel welcome to our family gathering. As always, I look forward to sharing worship with you each and every week.







PERSONAL CARE KITS

SOME IMPORTANT GUIDELINES TO REMEMBER

- Be sure to shop for light- or medium-weight towels, which are easier for Kit recipients to hand wash and air dry, take up less storage space and are considerably less expensive than the fluffier towels we may prefer to use.
- Bath towels vary in size. The 52" X 27" size listed in the guidelines is the maximum size. 20" x 40" is a good guideline for a minimum size.
- · Please give new items only.
- Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, messages or your group's name.
- Please do not donate any items decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.
- . Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed.
- · All items should be new and in good condition.
- . Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.

INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING IN EACH PERSONAL CARE KIT

П	ONE light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
	TW0 or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping
	ONE adult-size tooth brush in its original packaging*
	ONE sturdy comb, remove packaging
	ONE metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging

 Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an Individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope; no plastic bags or wrap

HOW TO PACK YOUR PROJECT PROMISE KITS

- Fold the towel in half. Place the rest of the items in the towel, fold and roll so nothing falls out, and secure with yarn, ribbon, string or rubber bands.
- Pack completed Kits, like items together, in boxes.
 Label contents in LARGE, BLOCK LETTERS on the outside of the boxes.
- Use strong cartons secured with packing tape, not to exceed 40 pounds.
- . Do not use plastic or paper bags to pack donations.
- Include the name and address of your group or congregation on each box and label the contents
