Pastor's Message:

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Normally my December Newsletter article focuses on the birth of Jesus, but this year I want to come at it from a different angle - I want to look at the story of the Magi whose arrival in Bethlehem we celebrate on January 6^{th} ; the Festival of the Epiphany of Our Lord. This story is found only in Matthew 2:1-12. While we think we know this story, we make several assumptions about the story which may not be factual, so lets just take a moment to read it more carefully.

First, notice in verse 1 the visitors from the east are not kings but wise men. The Greek word could also be translated as seers, astrologers, or magi {Zoroastrian Priests}. Second, note that we are not told how many of them there were, just that there was more than one. Traditionally we have claimed three of them, and we have given each one a home and a name (Melchior came from Persia, Caspar from India, and Balthazar from Arabia). It is most likely that we have landed on three as the number due to the number of gifts: gold, frankincense and myrrh, figuring one gift for each Magi. Third, we usually show the wise men presenting their gifts to the baby in the manger with cows and donkeys still around. However, the text in verse 11 uses the word house, a very different description. Finally, we tend to display the wise men at the manger giving the appearance that they were there that first night (maybe just missing the shepherd on the road). Yet most scholars believe that they were not there the first night rather some months later, maybe as much as two years. This assumes that the star does not appear until Christ was born and that same great light that drew the shepherds was that same star. Also, the brutal response of Herod to have all children 2 years old and under killed, was predicated on the Magi disclosing when they first saw that star. Now while Herod might have well padded the date to be sure, it most certainly was months after the birth that they finally arrived, not Christmas night. Having cleared the "traditional trappings" from this story does not however, in any way diminish its significance.

So what gifts do the Magi bring to us this Christmas?

First, they bring us the reminder to see the star and to use it as a guiding light in our lives. These were obviously people of faith in that they seemed to understand the world to be a creation of God who continues still to care for us and uses it to give us guidance.

If we understand Jesus to be the "Light of the world", then we, like the Magi, need to keep our eyes focused on the star and use him as a guiding light in our lives. It is important to remember that the journey the wise men took was a long and challenging one but by keeping their eye on the star there were directed to the place they needed to be.

Second, let us unpack the three treasurers they brought as gifts to the Christ Child.

Gold - was the item of most value and because of its great expense, it was normally associated with those in power. It was the gift appropriate to give to a King. When we sing Handel's Messiah we sing: "He is king of king and lord of lords". But this is not just a stewardship gift (although we ought to be honoring Christ the King with our monetary gifts fit for a king) but it also reminds us that as our sovereign ruler we need to view the world through his eyes and allow it to determine how we rule in this world.

Frankincense - this was the gift given to Christ the High Priest. We understand that Jesus functions as the only intermediary we will ever need between us and God. It is Jesus who sealed this relationship with his obedient death on the cross - shedding his blood to pay for our sin debt. As our High Priest, the gift of frankincense reminds us of the importance of being in a state of worship of God, not just on Sundays but every day. Worship isn't just what we do on Sunday morning, but how we lift up our praise and prayers to God every day; whether it be morning and evening prayers or simply saying grace at mealtime.

Myrrh may be the least known and understood. Myrrh was the gift given to honor the third element of Jesus' identity. He was not only the King and High Priest; he also was a prophet. A prophet is not a fortune teller, but a forth-teller. He is one who speaks the truth to the condition of our world and calls us to repent and turn to God. Just like the prophets of the Old Testament, Jesus the prophet was not received by all as a welcome proclaimer of truth, and like the prophets he was killed for it. Hence the Myrrh - an ointment used in preparation of a body for burial. For us, the gift of myrrh reminds us of the call of prophecy which we continue to carry with us as disciples of Christ. We are to speak out against corruption and sin; not just as a political statement, but as a reminder of the condition of sin which continues to plague our world.

As we prepare for this year's Christmas celebration I would encourage you to be the magi of our day: to keep focused on the star as your guiding light in all your life's decisions. To honor Christ the King, not just with gifts to family and friends, but to those who are in need. To honor Christ the High Priest with daily devotions and weekly worship attendance. And lastly, to honor Jesus the prophet with a willingness to be a voice of renewal and reform in our world.



Evangelical Durham introduces new Online giving options.



We have partnered with Vanco to add the ability to make contributions or donations online. The feature is currently in "beta testing" Beta testing means that it is fully up and running, and we are taking it through its paces before the formal rollout at the end of the year.

This feature will be available to anyone with internet access, and can be accessed from our web site, or by downloading the "Vanco Faith" application from your phone's app store.

This new tool has the following advantages: For you:

- No longer need to use envelopes, all the most used giving categories are also available online.
- Can set up automatic giving on a schedule with weekly, monthly, quarterly or annual frequency options for convenience, and revise or cancel the schedule and amount when ever you need.
- All online contributions are automatically included on your giving statements.
- Uses the same secure / proven technology that we have already been using for Simply Giving for the past 20+ years. If you already use Simply Giving, you can choose to switch to Vanco Faith, or stay with Simply Giving, whichever you prefer.

For the Church:

- Reduced burden on offering counters for processing envelopes and deposits after each service.
- Reduced overhead for the Financial Secretary, since all online contribution are automatically deposited to the church account, and posted directly to your statement in our church's software.
- Reduced opportunity for reconciliation error in processing contributions.
- Make it easier for non-member contributors to make donations, for memorials, etc.






