Pastor's Message February 2026

Dear sisters and brothers of Christ,

Typically, I use the February newsletter to highlight the theme for Lent. Yet this year, what captures my interest is the Gospel theme assigned for the Sunday before Lent—the final Sunday after Epiphany known as The Transfiguration of Our Lord. This moment marked a pivotal shift in Jesus' ministry. Up until then, he concentrated on inviting his disciples and instructing them about discipleship. Following this event, Jesus resolutely turns toward Jerusalem, fully aware of the coming challenges at Calvary and the cross. As Jesus journeys closer to the crucifixion, his disciples continue their learning, but now they are also being prepared to step forward as witnesses to the world.

This year, as a congregation, it feels as though we are experiencing our own Mount of Transfiguration. Just as Jesus was joined by Moses and Elijah, we—today's disciples—are connected with the ministry of past prophets who have shaped Durham Lutheran's legacy. Our history, filled with love and richness, deserves to be honored and studied. However, much like the disciples who wished to preserve the past, there may be a desire to cling too tightly to what has come before. But that is not our calling. Like Peter, James, and John, we are meant to come down from the mountain, step into the world, and share the good news of Jesus Christ.

Much like the experience of the disciples, our collective journey will inevitably encounter various challenges and require us to pursue different directions at times. Nevertheless, this is an essential journey—one that should be embraced, as it reflects the ongoing mission and life of Jesus Christ that DLC is entrusted to continue here in Durham. While the congregation is undoubtedly warm and welcoming, it is important to remember our responsibility to be an inviting community. Relying solely on the hope that individuals will find us is insufficient; we are called to serve as witnesses, to share the narrative of Jesus Christ, and to proactively extend invitations to others to join us in service.

The church must remain dynamic; stagnation leads to decline. An unchanging community risks becoming obsolete. While there may be an inclination to preserve traditions from the past, it is with confidence in God's guidance that I anticipate many prosperous times ahead for DLC. In the coming months, we will collectively engage in a period of transition, encountering both opportunities and challenges as we explore new directions. Eventually, as our paths diverge, the core mission will persist, though there will be adjustments in leadership responsibilities.

During this Lenten Season, our focus will be on the theme "All In." The example set by Jesus illustrates total commitment to the reign of God, demonstrating what it means to be fully invested and deeply dedicated. Christians are called to lead lives marked by commitment and care for others and the world, even when such actions may be misunderstood or undervalued by surrounding cultures. Before we can commit wholly, it is important to recognize that God has already demonstrated complete investment on behalf of humanity, exemplifying what it means to choose love without reservation. Throughout Lent, we acknowledge that God's commitment precedes ours, and we are encouraged to respond by fully embracing God's love. It will be this "all in" commitment which will guide us on our journey down the mountain and into our next mission field.






WELCA's January meeting was held at Helen Dungan's home, and we were joined by Cheryl Mesko via phone. Our topic was prayer, and we shared some real needs for prayer; and the comfort of knowing that people are praying for us. Miriam Anderson updated us on the January soup sale; we will be pulling meat off the bones on Friday afternoon, and chopping vegetables on Saturday. We discussed distributing WELCA's money donations; deciding to donate \$700 to Southeast Pa's WELCA and \$700 to the church's building capital campaign. We had a bake sale while selling soup, but the weather was not cooperative. We decided to have a spaghetti dinner in March with the proceeds going to the capital campaign. We also discussed trying to institute a ministry of taking people to appointments who could not drive. The idea was to have a contact person who anyone needing a ride could call; and that person would contact one of the available volunteers. This would be a church ministry, not limited to WELCA.

Our February meeting will be Friday Feb. 20, 2026 at 10 a.m. at the home of Helen Dungan. We will continue our discussion on praying.
